

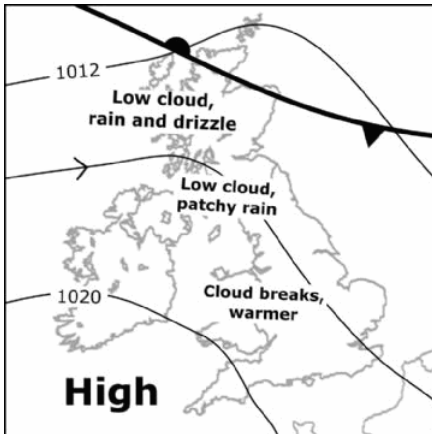

General Summary for Tuesday, 7 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary:
Based on forecast chart for noon 7 July, 2026

Windy over high terrain, strongest in the morning, again later in Scotland. Damp and murky north and western Highlands, more persistent rain at times. Some improvement southern Highlands in afternoon. Often dry for northern England, but higher fells shrouded in cloud. Brighter for Wales as cloud thins.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Blustery start, easing. Patchy cloud, tending to clear.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 7 July, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	West-northwesterly 30mph from dawn into early morning, with some stronger gusts not just on high tops. Easing to 20mph by middle of day, often less into afternoon, then rising a little to 20-25mph by evening.
Effect of wind on you?	Ease of walking affected early in the morning, some buffeting gusts affecting stability. Becoming fairly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Largely dry Some patches of light drizzly rain drifting along coastal slopes mainly in north in morning, but most places entirely dry.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting and mostly breaking afternoon A fairly extensive bank on upper slopes in the morning; highest tops near or above the top of the cloud sheet. A lifting trend and much cloud breaking up, though banks will cling to high western slopes for periods.
Chance of cloud free summits?	70% (summits above cloud early)
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sun increasingly breaking out widely; high tops may be in sun above cloud most of the day; thin high cloud. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	11 or 12C, rising to 14C, or slightly higher towards mid-Wales; little or no change with added height. Feeling like 3C if exposed to early wind on tops.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small.	Negligible.

Cloud on the hills?	Hills clear, some west coast fog Patchy cloud on western hill slopes early morning, higher terrain clear. All dispersing, but possible low-level coastal fog near Llyn Peninsula for periods.	Hills clear Patchy mist inland valleys at dawn, possible local coastal fog at times, but the hills clear.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Above 90%	Above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine and thin fair-weather cloud. Visibility very good.	Generally sunny, thin high cloud. Visibility very good, some low-level haze.
How Cold? (at 900m)	14C rising to 17C afternoon.	16C rising to 19C afternoon.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 8 July, 2026**

A drier and warmer window builds into the middle of this week: very warm in England and Wales. Still low cloud persistent especially toward northwest Scotland, but spells of sunshine spread northward, and lighter wind. Some rain late this week in western Scotland though mostly light and patchy, many places dry. High pressure expands across Scotland through the weekend bringing more widely clearer hills, dry and warm conditions in the extended outlook into mid July - easterly winds likely develop, particularly England and Wales; a chance of some isolated thunderstorms occasionally.
