

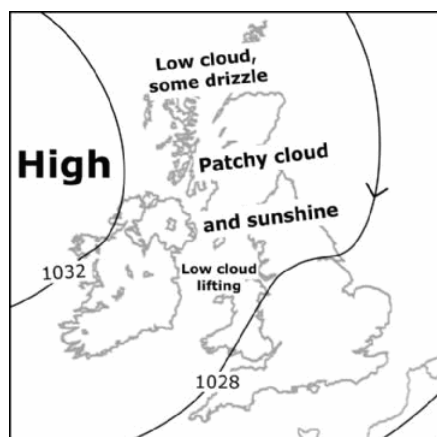

General Summary for Monday, 20 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 20 July, 2026

Some patchy drizzle and low cloud covering many northern mountains in the Highlands in the morning. Cloud persists on hills toward northwest coasts, tending to lift and break further inland. Hills in England & Wales mostly clear. Wind fairly light overall. Very dry ground and high fire risk remains.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Light wind. Dry, sun and fair-weather cloud, hills clearing.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 20 July, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	North to northwesterly 5-15mph; both speed and direction variable.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills?	Early mist, some banks on high tops Some early patchy mist in valleys, this soon fading but variable cloud banks form on higher terrain; clearest hills towards Moel Siabod and southward. With time, patches thin up to high summits and largely clearing.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising to 70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Often sunny, some fair weather cloud building. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	11C rising to 14C inland, only rising a degree or so north and west Eryri/Snowdonia NP.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Eryri / Snowdonia National Park - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 21 July	Wednesday 22 July
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Northwesterly 5 to 15mph, increasing a little during day, reaching 20-25mph high tops during evening and into night. Small most of the day, becoming breezier over hills later.	North to northwesterly 15 to 25mph, some gusts 30mph higher tops in northern areas. Feeling breezy and quite cool over higher terrain, starting to affect ease of walking and balance on exposed high ridges.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Largely dry Chance of an odd brief patch of drizzle northern hills in the morning.	Damp start toward north Drizzle and a little light rain possible over northern hills in the morning, largely fading into middle of day, but an odd light shower possible inland in the afternoon.
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly north in morning, clearing Patchy cloud banks grazing higher tops mainly in the Snowdon/Yr Wyddfa group for periods in the morning. Lifting to be well broken above tops into afternoon.	Early low cloud lifting and clearing Cloud banks early morning most widely over northern hills, possibly to 500-600m for a time, 700m and more broken further south; highest tops may be near top of cloud sheet. Rising to 800-900m then increasingly breaking during day.
Chance of cloud free summits?	50% rising to 90% afternoon	50% rising to 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of cloud and sun, sunshine best near coast in afternoon. Visibility very good.	Fairly cloudy, some sun breaking through, best mid-Wales. Visibility reduced around early dampness, then very good below cloud.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	12C, small change northwestern areas, rising to 15C toward mid-Wales tops. Above the summits.	10C rising to 13C. Feeling like 3 to 5C directly in the wind on high tops. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 21 July, 2026**

Largely dry weather prevails as high pressure remains nearby to the west. A northwesterly flow keeps temperatures nearer to average for the time of year, dawn temperatures in the middle single digits in Scotland; staying warm in England and Wales but maximum summit temperatures only to the high teens. Cloud and drizzle affects northwest Scotland more often, occasionally drifting further south. Despite this, ground remains very dry with high fire risk, with ongoing wildfire management limiting access in places. A more unsettled trend develops during next weekend, bringing wind, rain and showers first to Scotland and increasingly widely. England and Wales remain quite warm.
