

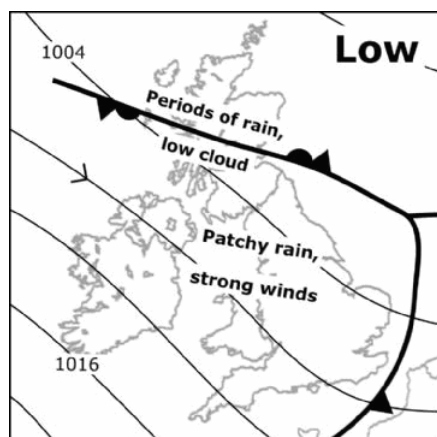
Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

General Summary for Sunday, 26 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 26 July, 2026

Spells of rain and showers affect most places during the day, some heavier falls toward eastern Scotland in afternoon. Cloud covering most high terrain, bases rising during day, breaks emerge at times. Blustery winds for England, Wales and southern Scotland, more moderate speeds for the Highlands.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Windy, gusts gale-force. Showery rain, cloud on tops.

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 26 July, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	West to northwesterly 30 to 35mph, gusts 40mph over the mountains.
Effect of wind on you?	Affecting comfortable walking and balance over higher terrain, buffeting gusts, in places more challenging on exposed ridges. Notable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showery rain Often raining over high terrain of Eryri/Snowdonia NP and north and western areas, a mix of drizzle with showery bursts. Occasional drier windows afternoon. Further east, the rain more showery, but at times more frequent too; generally easing later.
Cloud on the hills?	High terrain stays shrouded Terrain above 800m likely in cloud most or all day, more widely extensive to mid-slopes early. A few higher breaks afternoon, but also widely lowering during more showery periods. Slopes towards the west and north coasts more often shrouded.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Best bursts of sun towards east Wales. Varied visibility, very good where out of cloud and rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	10 or 11C. Feeling near to freezing in strongest wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Monday 27 July	Tuesday 28 July
How windy? (On the summits)	Northwesterly 15-20mph, shifting southwesterly, easing briefly, rising again afternoon, to 25-35mph later.	Southwesterly 25 to 40mph, gusts 50mph around higher northern tops.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, but walking becomes impacted over high terrain late in the day.	Strenuous walking conditions, frequent buffeting gusts knocking you off balance on exposed terrain. Marked wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Substantially dry Some fine drizzle over the high tops at times when in cloud, but more often entirely dry.	Drizzle and some rain west Drizzly rain frequent over western areas, some more steadier rain occasionally. Very little reaching eastern Wales.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting to tops with breaks Banks of cloud at varied elevations in the morning, some clear windows between layers possible. Through morning, mostly lifting to summit height, a few breaks from time to time, but caps also returning to the summits, and perhaps more extensive afternoon.	Extensive, may persist west Blanket cloud likely covering the hills, to lower elevations in west in the morning, 500-600m further northeast. Bases tend to rise, but may linger over west coast tops.
Chance of cloud free summits?	40%	10% rising to 30% west, 60% east.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly sunny early with good visibility, trending towards cloudier conditions afternoon, best chance of sun glimpses east.	Largely cloudy, misty in west, poor visibility widely in rain; some improvements and brief moments of sun east Wales.
How Cold? (at 900m)	8 or 9C rising to 12C, staying elevated overnight and may rise slightly.	12C northwest, little variation all day, to locally 15C eastern hills, quite humid. Feeling like 2 to 5C directly in wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 27 July, 2026

West-southwesterly winds will bring rain to most places early in the new week, some more prolonged heavier falls for western Scotland by Tuesday, accompanied by gales over high terrain, severe on Scottish tops, but rather humid for all, warm for England and Wales. Cooler air toward northwest Scotland moves across all of Scotland by Wednesday. Showery rain through mid-late week, some heavy and possibly thundery bursts, mainly Scotland. Likely drier for Wales and southern Pennines. More uncertainty toward next weekend and early the following week, but a risk of a broad zone of low pressure bringing areas of rain and heavy showers through early August.

Forecast issued at 16:00 on Saturday, 25 July, 2026
