

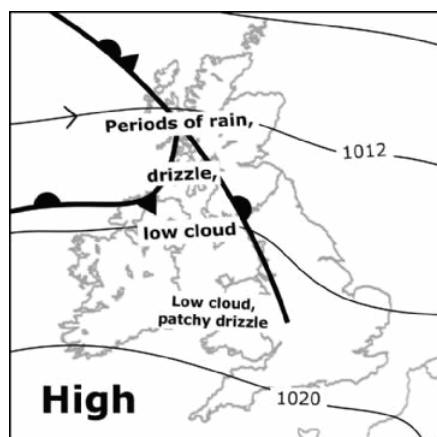

General Summary for Monday, 27 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 27 July, 2026

Fresh to strong west to southwesterly winds, rather cool on Scottish tops. Rain and drizzle frequent in western Scotland, patchier eastwards. Some drizzly rain for Lakes and north Wales. Low cloud affecting most western hills, higher bases eastwards.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Blustery, some drizzle, low cloud western tops.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 27 July, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 25mph, slightly less toward mid-Wales, gusts 30-35mph higher northern mountains, sustained speeds tending to rise in afternoon.
Effect of wind on you?	Ease of walking affected on tops, more strenuous with time with stability affected, balance at times challenging on ridges. Feeling rather cool on high terrain.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Drizzle mostly west Some fine drizzle over the high tops at times when in cloud, some drier moments in morning, but steadier drizzle developing for periods afternoon onward. Very little toward eastern hills.
Cloud on the hills?	Varied then lowering over hills more widely Banks of cloud at varied elevations in the morning, some clear windows between layers possible, lifting for a time with breaks. Cloud increasingly filling in over the hills into the afternoon, to mid-elevations near west coast, widely above 700-800m inland.
Chance of cloud free summits?	50% dropping to 20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly sunny early with good visibility, trending towards cloudier conditions afternoon, visibility reducing in drizzle.
How Cold? (at 900m)	8 or 9C rising to 12C, staying elevated into the night and may rise slightly. Feeling near to freezing directly in the wind on high tops.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Eryri / Snowdonia National Park - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 28 July	Wednesday 29 July
How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 25 to 40mph, gusts 50mph around higher northern tops.	South to southwesterly 20 to 30mph, gusty in places over higher terrain.
Effect of wind on you?	Strenuous walking conditions, frequent buffeting gusts knocking you off balance on exposed terrain. Marked wind chill.	Blustery over the hills, affecting comfortable walking at times on higher exposed tops and ridges.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Drizzle and some rain west Drizzly rain frequent over western areas, some more steadier rain occasionally. Very little reaching eastern Wales.	Local drizzle, chance a shower Some drizzle around low cloud on hills near Cardigan Bay. Chance of an isolated thundery burst of rain inland later in day.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive, may persist west Blanket cloud likely covering the hills, to lower elevations in west in the morning, 500-600m further northeast. Bases tend to rise, but may linger over west coast tops.	Mostly west coast hills Cloud banks to lower elevations on coastal hills in west, tending to thin but may linger around some slopes all day. Further north and east, odd patches, may largely clear.
Chance of cloud free summits?	10% rising to 30% west, 60% east.	30% west, to 70% north/east.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, misty in west, poor visibility widely in rain; some improvements and brief moments of sun east Wales.	Locally cloudy and misty in west, may improve. Otherwise sun and varied high cloud, visibility very good.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	12C northwest, little variation all day, to locally 15C eastern hills, quite humid. Feeling like 2 to 5C directly in wind. Above the summits.	12C rising to 15C, possible 18C mid-Wales. Some valleys reach 25C or above mainly inland and east; quite humid. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 28 July, 2026**

Southwesterly winds will bring rain to most places early this week, some more prolonged heavier falls for western Scotland into Tuesday, accompanied by gales over high terrain, severe on Scottish tops, but rather humid for all, warm for England and Wales. Cooler air toward northwest Scotland moves across all of Scotland by Wednesday. Showery rain through mid-late week, some heavy and possibly thundery bursts, mainly Scotland. Likely drier for Wales and southern Pennines. Remaining very uncertain detail toward next weekend and early the following week, but indications favour a broad zone of low pressure bringing areas of rain and heavy showers through early August.
