

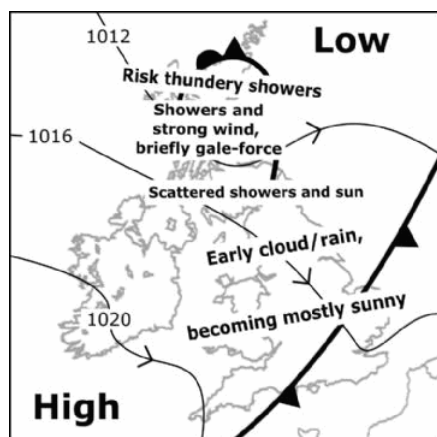

General Summary for Thursday, 30 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 30 July, 2026

Cool, windy, and showery in Scotland. Gales and heavy showers pass west-to-east across the highlands, showers most frequent with lightning risk north. Starting breezy with rain over the Pennines and Wales, this clearing east for sun, a few odd showers northwest England. Mild-to-warm England and Wales.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Early showers and cloud clear for increasing sun

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 30 July, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	West-northwesterly 10-20mph, strongest wind early with notable gusts over high tops and ridges.
Effect of wind on you?	Affecting ease of walking with some notable gustiness over high terrain early, but otherwise fairly small effects.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Early showers clear Rain and drizzle on and off after dawn will all clear.
Cloud on the hills?	Shrouding high terrain early, clear afternoon Fairly extensive above 700-800m at dawn, lower western hills, around rain. Bases soon rise and break as rain passes east, a few lingering caps over the summits until midday, then all clearing.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising through morning to greater than 90% early afternoon
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Fairly cloudy start, then sun breaking through, to become mostly sunny through afternoon. Visibility very good.
How Cold? (at 900m)	7 to 9C, may warm slightly eastern hills. Feeling near 0C in exposure to wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Friday 31 July	Saturday 1 August
How windy? (On the summits)	West to southwesterly 15 to 25mph, strongest northern tops, at times 30mph; trending stronger with time.	Westerly 10-15mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Starting to affect comfortable walking at times on higher tops and ridges. Noticeable wind chill.	Small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Brief local showers One or two showers passing west to east.	Substantially dry Occasional showers drift onto western hills from dawn, a few drifting further east (notably afternoon), but plenty of dry windows with most hills staying entirely dry.
Cloud on the hills?	Capping tops in morning, lifting Patchy cloud soon mostly above 700m early morning, lifting toward higher tops, may come and go for a few hours, but increasingly clearing into afternoon.	Early cloud largely clears summits Terrain above 700-800m starts in cloud, lowest bases western Glyder and Snowdon groups locally to 600m. Bases lift, soon clearing hills in east-Wales. Summits largely clear afternoon, though an odd cap may graze Yr Wyddfa/Snowdon.
Chance of cloud free summits?	70%	Rising to 80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of cloud and sun; coastal areas sunnier afternoon onward. Visibility very good.	A patchwork of cloud and sun, may push eastward afternoon for frequent sun. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	7C rising to 9 or 10C afternoon. Feeling just above freezing in strongest wind over summits.	7 to 9C, mildest inland.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 31 July, 2026

Cool and showery westerlies into the weekend, windy over high terrain; western hills often capped in cloud. Southern Pennines and Wales likely see only scattered showers and remain warm . Cloud encroaches from the southwest on Sunday, winds turn southerly and warmer air wafts back across England and Wales . A complex area of low pressure is then expected to circulate slowly over Britain early next week, bringing areas of rain and heavy showers, some thundery downpours possible. Winds varying, trending northerly and strengthening, to gales over high summits on Tuesday. A window of improvement from midweek, which may persist into the weekend, but a showery northwesterly persists in Scotland. Beware ongoing fire management restricting access to some mountains.
