

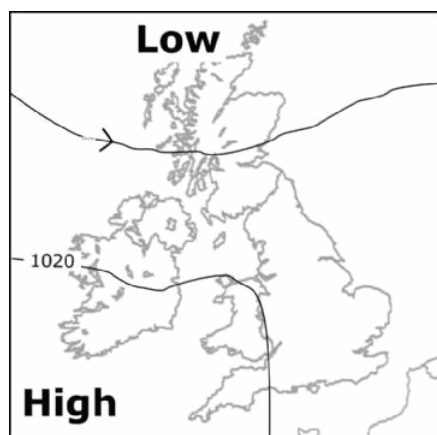
Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

General Summary for Friday, 31 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 31 July, 2026

Westerly winds, tending to strengthen through the day will continue to bring lower temperatures to the mountains (particularly W & NW Scotland), Showers, throughout day W and NW Highlands, but mostly afternoon elsewhere - and few if any S Pennines and Wales.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Small shower risk.

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 31 July, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 10-15mph, a strengthening trend through day, perhaps 20mph over tops in Snowdon range by about mid afternoon.
Effect of wind on you?	Small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain unlikely - chance of brief shower Chance of the odd shower,
Cloud on the hills?	All or nearly all clearing by late morning All or almost all clearing after being fairly widespread on higher slopes particularly western hills until mid or late morning. (There could just be the odd patch coming and going coastal slopes through the day).
Chance of cloud free summits?	Almost certain by late morning
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of bright sunshine - from west most areas increasingly sunny through afternoon. The air very clear indeed.
How Cold? (at 900m)	7C rising to 9 to 12C afternoon, coldest summits near west coast.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Eryri / Snowdonia National Park - Looking Ahead

	Saturday 1 August	Sunday 2 August
How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 10-15mph, occasionally 20mph higher tops (mainly Snowdon range).	Varied direction 10mph or less; but later easterly, possibly 15mph toward dusk.
Effect of wind on you?	Small.	Negligible.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Substantially or completely dry Chance of the odd brief shower.	Rain unlikely until almost dusk Increasing threat of rain toward or more likely after dusk.
Cloud on the hills?	Early cloud largely clears summits Terrain above 700-800m starts in cloud, lowest western hills Snowdon range. Bases lift, soon clearing most or all summits by late morning. Then only isolated, if any cloud on higher tops.	Very little at all Possibly in morning fragments on coastal slopes (not necessarily confined to higher areas).
Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising to greater than 90%	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A patchwork of sun, may push eastward afternoon for frequent sun. Very good visibility.	Sunshine will gradually give way as high cloud thickens. Excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	7 rising to 9 to 14C, , warmest eastern hills.	9C rising to 15C.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 1 August, 2026

Extensively dry with cloud widely confined above the mountains this weekend, although mainly Saturday in Scotland, showers and on western mountains areas of low cloud. Relatively chilly on the west and NW Highlands, but otherwise fairly normal temperatures for early August.

Very complicated early next week; areas of rain will drift slowly across central and northern Britain, but the distribution of rain (and associated low cloud) very uncertain. Probably very little rain across Wales.

Despite some rain (mainly in Scotland), away from the W & NW Highlands terrain remains exceptionally dry 'tinder dry'.
