

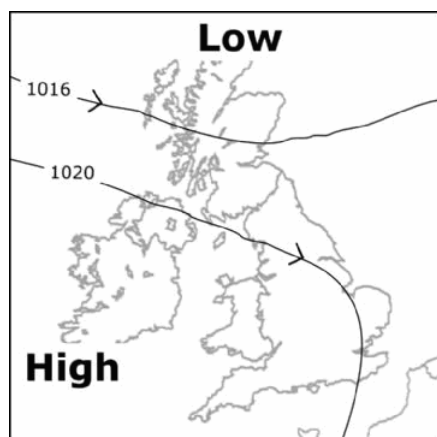
Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

General Summary for Saturday, 1 August, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 1 August, 2026

England and Wales extensively dry with periods of sun and particularly Wales fairly light wind. Increasingly showery northwards across Scotland, although mostly confined to afternoon eastern mountains. Fairly chilly, particularly morning.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Light wind; periods of sun. Small risk brief shower.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 1 August, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 10-15mph, perhaps occasionally 20mph higher tops (mainly Snowdon range).
Effect of wind on you?	Small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Substantially or completely dry Chance of the odd brief shower.
Cloud on the hills?	Early cloud largely clears summits Some terrain above 700-800m starts in cloud, lowest and most widespread western hills of Snowdon range. Bases lift, clearing most or all summits by mid or late morning. Then only isolated, if any cloud on higher tops.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising to greater than 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive bright sunshine. Very good becoming excellent or superb visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	7 rising to 10 to 13C, warmest eastern hills.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Sunday 2 August	Monday 3 August
How windy? (On the summits)	Generally easterly 10mph. Toward evening will begin to strengthen, perhaps 20mph by dusk.	Easterly 20 to 25mph, possibly sometimes 30mph; very gusty in places.
Effect of wind on you?	Negligible.	Mostly fairly small, but expect sudden gusts to develop (sometimes on lower slopes) making balance tricky.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain unlikely until almost dusk Small risk rain toward or more likely after dusk.	Rain now and again Low confidence as general of low pressure develops across Britain: Occasional rain likely, mostly afternoon or evening, when there may be heavy bursts.
Cloud on the hills?	Not expected	Patches may form in rain Most or all hills cloud free, probably all day. But in rain, most likely only later in day fog may begin to shroud some higher slopes, and possibly here and there extend to lower slopes.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Almost certain	70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine will give way as high cloud thickens. Excellent visibility.	Sunshine, sometimes weak, through thin high cloud. Some haze, although generally very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9C rising to 15C.	15C
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 2 August, 2026

Still a few showers W & NW Highlands on Sunday, and threat of some rain by dusk western mountains. The rain will be ahead of a very complicated weather pattern early next week; areas of rain will drift slowly across central and mainly northern Britain, but the distribution of rain (and associated low cloud) remains very uncertain.

Despite some recent rain (mainly in Scotland), away from the W & NW Highlands terrain remains exceptionally dry: 'tinder dry'.
