

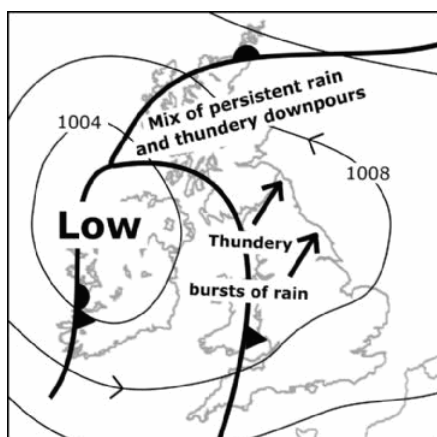

General Summary for Tuesday, 4 August, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 4 August, 2026

Extensive rain and low cloud across Scotland, becoming thundery downpours into the afternoon from the south into the Highlands. For England & Wales, rain and low cloud most persistent in the morning, heavy showery bursts in middle of day tending to clear eastward afternoon. Strong and gusty winds widely.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Low cloud, thundery bursts of rain; improving. Breezy.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 4 August, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	South-southwesterly 25 to 30mph, gusty around showers, and sustained speeds generally rising to 30-35mph in afternoon on higher western mountains.
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery over the mountains, affecting comfortable walking and balance on exposed tops and ridges. Feeling cool in the wind despite mild air.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers, some heavy bursts, risk thunder, mostly clearing afternoon. Pulses of rain and heavy showers, a risk of thunder and lightning through morning and middle of day, but tending to clear northeastward to just well scattered brief showers afternoon onward.
Cloud on the hills?	Low cloud rising, some breaks later In morning, expect blanket of fog across higher areas, ragged patches to some lower slopes. An improvement during the day as cloud base lifts toward 700m, and some breaks higher up later in day.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% rising to 60% afternoon
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sunshine, developing more widely from west during afternoon. Hazy start, visibility poor in rain, improving to become increasingly very good.
How Cold? (at 900m)	13C, up to 16C out of cloud eastern tops. Feeling like 2 to 5C directly in the wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Wednesday 5 August	Thursday 6 August
How windy? (On the summits)	West-southwesterly, often 30 to 40mph, risk up to 50mph northern tops mostly in the afternoon.	Northwest then westerly 25mph, up to 30-35mph for a few hours from dawn, tending to ease toward 20mph afternoon.
Effect of wind on you?	Often strenuous walking on high terrain, making balance challenging on ridges. Marked wind chill.	Blustery morning, affecting ease of walking and balance on tops and ridges, lessening. Feeling rather chilly on tops.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showery rain Rain most common on western hills, amounts fairly small, but risk locally frequent with odd heavier showers. Scattered showers passing eastwards.	Early showers fade Showers from dawn into early morning, tending to fade to be often dry, rare light showers into middle of day onward. A little light rain may return from dusk.
Cloud on the hills?	Most persistent west Covering many higher slopes much of the day above 600-800m, lowest and most persistent west coasts and during rain. Some breaks forming where dry in east.	Lifting and breaking above tops Cloud banks above 700-800m in the morning, most common toward west. Lifting to higher tops then largely clearing the hills, odd patches on highest summits.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%	70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Brief sun breaking through mainly east. A general slight haze, reduced further in rain.	Patchwork of cloud and sun. Visibility very good.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	8 or 9C, little change all day. Feeling near or below freezing in the stronger wind. Above the summits.	7C rising to 9C afternoon. Feeling close to freezing if exposed to wind on tops. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 5 August, 2026

Low pressure over the country during midweek brings strong winds, rain and thundery showers. Trending toward westerlies later in the week and into weekend, by then most rain and low cloud in western Scotland, but showery rain elsewhere at times, accompanied by periods of strong to gale force mountain winds at times. Generally fresh temperatures widely, often in mid-single figures over Scottish high tops. Despite falls of rain, beware of ongoing fire management restricting access to hills locally.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Monday, 3 August, 2026
