

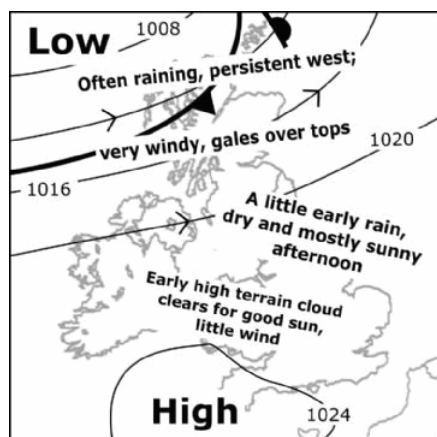

General Summary for Friday, 7 August, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 7 August, 2026

Rain in the Scottish Highlands, persistent central/west areas; windy too, gales developing over summits. Some early rain in England, cloud covering high terrain, improving for frequent sun and minimal hill cloud. Light wind and mostly sunny Wales, just some early cloud and dampness high Snowdonia terrain.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Early hill cloud lifts to high tops with breaks; light wind

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 7 August, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	West-southwesterly 10-15mph, sometimes less.
Effect of wind on you?	Small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	A little morning drizzle Drizzle here and there high terrain and western slopes and mountains morning, extensively or completely dry afternoon.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting to summits Most high terrain shrouded early with varied lower patchy banks, most extensive west with banks to 500m. Cloud lifts to largely just caps over high summits afternoon, clear windows appearing with time.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising to 70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchy cloud, breaks increasingly forming for extended sunny windows later. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	8C rising to 10 or 11C, staying elevated into night.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 8 August, 2026

Westerly winds prevail into the weekend: Saturday will see extensive cloud and heavy rain develop across Scotland with gales; bands of rain passing to the south and east into England and Wales through Sunday with showers in Scotland. A ridge of high pressure early next week brings warmer temperatures and clearer hills, though western areas likely remain fairly cloudy with some drizzle on the high tops. Westerly flow returns through mid-week and a series of low pressure systems will pass west-to-east across the country with periods of strong wind (sometimes gales), rain, and low cloud, western hill groups always most affected. Mild-to-warm temperatures and sometimes quite humid. Changeable conditions persist into next weekend.

Forecasts are issued daily by 16:30 and are kept under review and amended as necessary. However, expected conditions can still change after issue. © Copyright Mountain Weather Information Service, 2026.
