

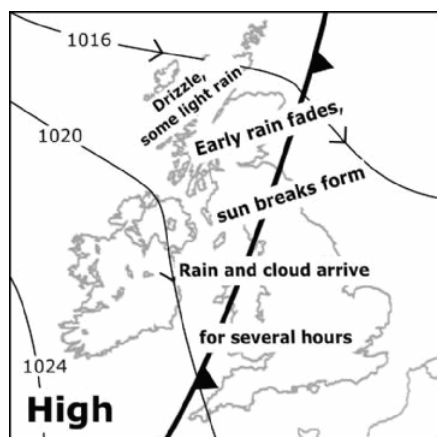

General Summary for Friday, 14 August, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 14 August, 2026

A band of rain over central Scotland in the morning sweeps into England and Wales; some heavy bursts with extensive cloud. Rain eases afternoon, to patches over Wales and the Peak District. Drizzle and light rain follows in west Scotland, little reaching eastward where high cloud breaks form.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Cloud fills in extensively, a period of frequent rain

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 14 August, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 10-15mph. Later, shifting north-northwesterly and rapidly strengthening towards 20mph or stronger over tops and may further strengthen overnight.
Effect of wind on you?	Small most of the day, though a notable rise in speed later will affect comfort of walking on high tops.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy rain, some drizzle; a period of heavier falls From dawn, light patchy rain affects some hills with a drizzle on high tops and western hills. Rain will become more frequent with heavy bursts for a few hours, at least, tending to break into lighter patches again later.
Cloud on the hills?	Soon extensive Cloud shrouds high terrain from dawn, and many western slopes, spreading widely to at least middle slopes, or lower patches on windward western slopes during rain. May begin to break later in the day, but perhaps only towards sunset.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Soon overcast and dull. Visibility increasingly poor with cloud and rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	16C, gradually lowering, notably afternoon and finishing near 11 or 12C, further lowering overnight.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Saturday 15 August	Sunday 16 August
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Northerly 20-25mph at dawn, strong gusts over high terrain and downslope southward; easing to 15-20mph with time. Blustery in exposure with considerable buffeting early, tending to ease towards fairly small effects.	Generally northwesterly but some variability, 10-15mph. Mostly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	A little light rain, fading In the morning, some spotty light rain drifts onto the hills from the north, drizzly on high terrain in cloud as well. Rain will ease for a dry afternoon.	Little expected A few odd patches of rain may drift onto the hills, generally light in nature and many hills often dry; small chance of a heavier fall.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Lifting to high summits Fairly extensive early, particularly northwestern areas; some breaks at varied elevations south and east. Lifting through morning, to just banks over high terrain. Highest summits may see few breaks until later. Rising to 40%	Lifting to summits, and likely above Banks of cloud at varied heights in the morning, lifting towards high terrain, and likely off the summits for extended periods. Broader layers may cover high terrain should rain occur. 60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely sunny, some high cloud; cloudier through morning on high terrain. Very good visibility.	Often sunny though often weakened by high cloud. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	9 or 10C. Above the summits.	9 or 10C, only slight rise, mainly east. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 15 August, 2026

Though the weekend, high pressure is never far away to the southwest, keeping conditions generally drier and brighter across England and Wales, though a northwesterly flow will bring some cloud to western hills. Scotland is more often cloudy with patchy rain, mostly north and west, and a rising risk of cloud and some bursts of rain more widely into Sunday with fresher air. Windier and wetter conditions are indicated next week, though day-by-day detail is currently uncertain. Monday sees a rising risk of strengthening wind and rain, at least in northern areas, then a blustery northwesterly wind draws fresher air and showers more widely through midweek; some drier, brighter windows to the east. Staying mixed into next weekend.
