

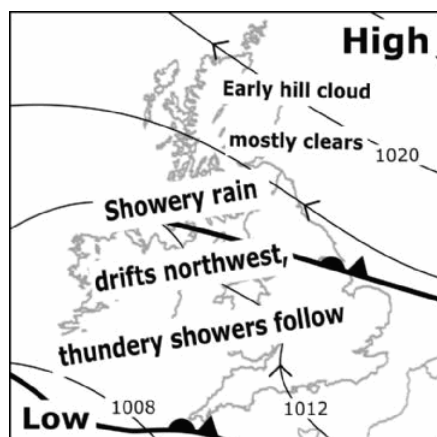

General Summary for Wednesday, 26 August, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 26 August, 2026

East Scotland, the Pennines, and Wales start cloudy, this lifting, dissipating over much of Scotland. Early showery rain and cloud in Wales migrates to England and southwest Scotland, thundery showers following over Wales and England; driest/clearest northwest Scotland. Warm, humid, and breezy.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Early rain breaks, thundery bursts later; warm and humid

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 26 August, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Southeasterly 25-30mph and gusty early in day, a gradual easing tendency, towards 10-15mph later.
Effect of wind on you?	Early gustiness affecting stability in the morning, tending to ease to become fairly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Early rain, risk thundery bursts later A risk of steady rain and drizzle over a few early hours, tending to clear northwards. During afternoon, risk of heavier bursts of rain forming with possible thunder; location of afternoon showers is uncertain, and may mostly stay towards eastern areas.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive, lifting, but variable over tops Cloud fairly widely shrouding hills above 500-600m, lower banks toward east, patches from forest canopies upward around rain. Tending to rise and later break up somewhat, but patches may cling to high tops, and variably lower where rain occurs.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% rising to 40%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly overcast, sun increasingly breaking out later but some thin high cloud around too. Hazy start, visibility improving to be good when dry.
How Cold? (at 900m)	12C rising to 14C, quite humid. Staying elevated and may rise further into night. Feeling like 5C in the wind at first.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 27 August, 2026

Heavy, thundery rain likely affects England, Wales & southern Scotland on Thursday and Friday, potentially prolonged heavy falls bringing a risk of local flooding. A westerly wind will establish into the weekend, drawing cloud and drizzle onto western high terrain, several frontal systems sweeping more broadly across the country. The strongest wind and heavy rain may pass mostly across England and Wales, with the lightest rain in west Scotland. Best chance of cloud base rising towards higher terrain in western areas, perhaps briefly to higher summits, but the hills more often shrouded, patches to low slopes around heaviest rain. A west-southwesterly weather track prevails next week: cloud and drizzle on western hill groups (particularly west Scotland), breezy, areas of rain regularly spreading more widely.

Forecasts are issued daily by 16:30 and are kept under review and amended as necessary. However, expected conditions can still change after issue. © Copyright Mountain Weather Information Service. 2026.
