

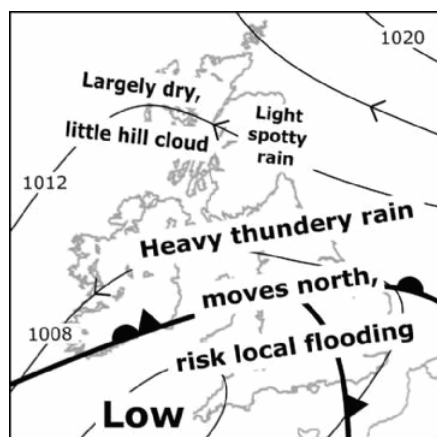

## General Summary for Thursday, 27 August, 2026



### British Mountain Summary:

#### Based on forecast chart for noon 27 August, 2026

Heavy, thundery rain moves north through Wales and England, showery thunderstorms following in Wales; beware sudden gusts, rapidly rising streams, and local flooding. Hill cloud and a little patchy rain in east Scotland; much of west Scotland clear of cloud, though some haze around.

| <b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>                | Southeasterly 25-35mph, gradually easing and shifting southwesterly, later settling near 15-20mph, or locally lighter.                                                                                                                                                                      |
| <b>Effect of wind on you?</b>                     | <b>Strenuous walking early with notable buffeting gusts affecting stability, gradually easing, towards mostly small effects later in the day.</b>                                                                                                                                           |
| <b>How wet?</b><br>(Precipitation and its impact) | <b>Heavy rain, thundery bursts</b><br>Heavy rain setting in from dawn, thundery falls mixed in. Tending to break into more showery rain with time, but remaining rather frequent with thundery downpours continuing. Beware rapidly rising streams and local flood risk.                    |
| <b>Cloud on the hills?</b>                        | <b>Extensive most of the day</b><br>Cloud soon fills in from at least middle slopes upward, patches increasingly lower into valleys during heaviest rain. Later as rain breaks, lifting, but slopes towards Cardigan Bay will be slow to clear above 700-800m, and high tops may not clear. |
| <b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>              | <b>10%</b>                                                                                                                                                                                                                                                                                  |
| <b>Sunshine?</b><br>Air clarity (below cloud)     | Soon overcast and dull with poor visibility. Some late patchy sunshine with very good visibility away from fog and showers.                                                                                                                                                                 |
| <b>How Cold? (at 900m)</b>                        | 13 to 15C, perhaps warmest in the morning on west slopes; fluctuating by several degrees around showers.                                                                                                                                                                                    |

## All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 28 August, 2026

Heavy, thundery rain affects England, Wales & eastern Scotland on Friday, prolonged heavy falls bringing a risk of local flooding. A westerly wind will establish over the weekend, drawing cloud and drizzle onto western high terrain, several frontal systems sweeping more broadly across the country. The strongest wind and heavy rain may pass mostly across England and Wales, with the lightest rain in Scotland. Hills often shrouded in cloud, low patches around rain; only local improvements. A west-southwesterly weather track prevails next week: cloud and drizzle on western hill groups (particularly west Scotland), breezy with areas of rain regularly spreading widely at times. A few brighter interludes through the week, and a chance of a more settled window in the south into the weekend.

Forecasts are issued daily by 16:30 and are kept under review and amended as necessary. However, expected conditions can still change after issue. © Copyright Mountain Weather Information Service, 2026.
