

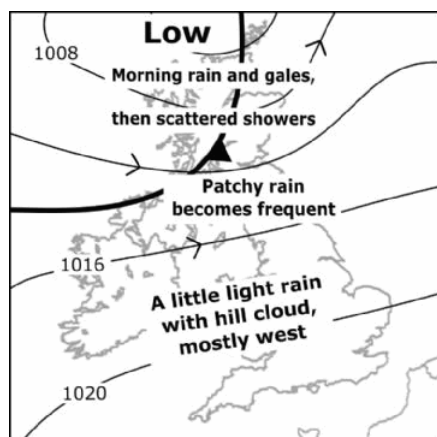

General Summary for Tuesday, 1 September, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 1 September, 2026

A swathe of rain and gales sweeps across the Scottish Highlands, moving over the Southern Uplands with time; bright sun breaks and scattered showers follow from the northwest. Patchy rain for western hills of England and Wales, sunny breaks east. Blustery with rain increasing later in north England.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Drizzle and some patchy rain comes and goes; breezy

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 1 September, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	West to southwesterly 20 to 25mph, stronger gusts forming at times, and sustained winds may reach up to 30mph for a few later hours.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small much of the day, but becoming blustery in exposure later in the day, gusts affecting stability and ease of walking.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Generally damp in west A mix of drizzle and some showery rain much of the day over western hills. Smaller amounts further east.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive, lowest west Banks of cloud often cap higher slopes above 700 to 800m, lowest near Cardigan Bay and variably lowering, sometimes towards 500m. Some breaks at times, best further east where only patchy on tops.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchy sunshine, best in eastern areas with some extended sunny windows, but high cloud will thicken and some cloudier moments too. Visibility reduced in rain, better if drier, more often east.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9C rising a degree, locally reaching 11C. Feeling just above freezing in exposure in strongest wind later.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 2 September, 2026

The next week remains generally unsettled, and may well bring a deep low pressure systems with widespread gales and swathes of heavy rain. Beyond next week, indications of a more settled regime for a time.
