

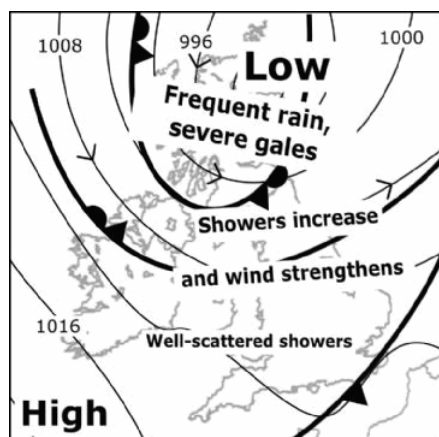

General Summary for Tuesday, 8 September, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 8 September, 2026

Frequent rain and severe gales over Scottish Highlands, easing from west later; feeling cold. Strong wind with showers and sun breaks in south Scotland and England, showers increasingly frequent from north, extended falls forming. Showers scattered in Wales, least rain south with lighter wind.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Increasingly blustery in exposure; scattered showers

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 8 September, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 25-30mph, strengthening and shifting northwesterly through afternoon, finishing at a sustained 35mph in exposure.
Effect of wind on you?	May start fairly small on hills towards southern Snowdonia NP, but soon widely blustery, some more strenuous conditions on exposed tops and ridges later in the day and feeling chilly.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Scattered showers Showers come and go from the northwest through the day, generally on the lighter side, but a rising risk of more frequent showers with local heavy falls as afternoon goes.
Cloud on the hills?	Largely just summits, varied broader banks, mostly later Cloud over high terrain early, lowest bases to the west including to mid-Wales as low as 500m. A lifting trend, with just banks over summits for a time, but bases return lower during showers, and later longer periods of lower cloud as bands of rain become more frequent.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising to 50% for a time
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A patchwork of sunshine, best on low eastern slopes, more often cloudy later in the day. Good visibility though some haze near coasts.
How Cold? (at 900m)	7C. Feeling just below freezing in direct wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Northwesterly 25-30mph to start, easing 15-20mph afternoon, shifting westerly and may further lessen. Blustery on tops to start, a chilly feeling, easing to small effects with time.	Southwesterly 15-20mph, rising tendency, notably afternoon, tops speeds to 30-35mph evening, rising further after dark. Fairly small, but becoming blustery, ease of walking impacted into evening.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	A little rain, mostly morning Patchy rain drifts into Snowdonia NP and the Llyn Peninsula from before dawn, gradually breaking up and becoming substantially dry with time. Little or no rain reaches hills near Bala.	Little until later A few spots of drizzly rain drift onto hills in west Snowdonia NP/Llyn Peninsula from time to time, dry windows too. Later, a larger band of rain sweeps in from the west, setting in persistently into evening.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising to high Snowdon group summits Fairly extensive above middle slopes from Llyn Peninsula to Carneddau, but lifting and breaking up, hills southeast of Snowdon group substantially clearing. Banks roll over highest summits but breaks will form here too. 30%, later rising to 60%	Mostly western hills, more extensive into evening Hills from Snowdon group west to Llyn Peninsula often shrouded above 700m. Some early cloud towards Carneddau and east Wales will break up, and perhaps more widely broken for a few hours. Into evening, cloud becoming more widely extensive. 40%, later deteriorating
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sun increasingly frequent, particularly towards east Wales. Good visibility, a little early haze.	Sunny windows, best afternoon, becoming overcast into evening. Good visibility, a haze towards the Irish Sea.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	7C, rising a degree, or to 9C towards Berwyn group. Feeling just below freezing to start, wind chill effect easing. Above the summits.	7C rising to 9C, staying elevated into night. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 9 September, 2026

Generally unsettled through the week with spells of rain and showers moving in from the Atlantic, accompanied by strong to gale force mountain winds. Temperatures will vary, mildest toward the south, but cooler air moves in from the north at times bringing higher Scottish tops occasionally close to freezing point, feeling cold in the wind chill. A few high pressure ridges bring settled windows, notably afternoons of Wednesday and Friday; northwestern areas, particularly in Scotland, will tend to hold onto some hill cloud despite high pressure.

Weather remains varied from the weekend into next week, Scotland most often unsettled, best windows of improvement to the south. A more settled period is indicated in the later month with warm temperatures.
