

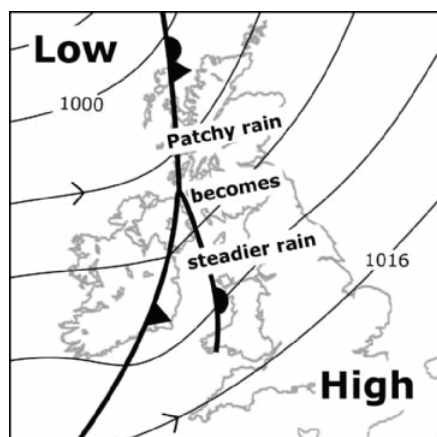

General Summary for Thursday, 10 September, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 10 September, 2026

Windy, gales over Scottish mountains and increasingly on higher tops of England & Wales. Rain starts patchy and light but becomes persistent over western hills, extending eastwards with time. Cloud capping most high tops, lowering in rain particularly in the west.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Wind strengthens to gales on tops. Rain develops.

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 10 September, 2026

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southwesterly soon widely 30mph higher mountains, rising into middle of day to 40-45mph, stronger gusts 50mph around tops during afternoon. Moderating from dusk onward to 25mph. Walking becomes strenuous, increasingly arduous in exposure on higher terrain, strongest gusts requiring effort to maintain stability; notable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Local drizzle, rain more widely and heavier afternoon A few spots of drizzly rain drift onto hills in west Snowdonia NP/Llyn Peninsula from time to time in morning, dry windows too. With time, rain becomes more frequent, setting in for several hours over western hills, some heavier falls afternoon. Smaller amounts extend eastward. Breaking up into lighter showers from dusk.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Mostly western hills, more extensive later Hills from Snowdon group west to Llyn Peninsula often shrouded above 700m. Some early cloud towards Carneddau and east Wales will break up, and more widely broken for a few hours. From mid-afternoon, cloud increasingly fills in, lowering in rain, to mid-slopes near Cardigan Bay later. 40%, lowering to 10% afternoon
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun mainly north and east, high cloud builds, then mostly cloudy. Good visibility, a haze towards the Irish Sea.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	7C rising to 9C, slightly higher later in day, then lowering slightly into night. Feeling near or just below freezing in strongest wind. Above the summits.

	Friday 11 September	Saturday 12 September
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Northwesterly 20-25mph to start, easing, to 10-15mph afternoon. Starting to increase again into night. Blustery and cool in exposure early in day, becoming mostly small.	Southwesterly, rising through dawn to 40-50mph, may reach 60mph higher northern tops during the day. Challenging conditions with increasingly powerful gusts to some low levels; walking becoming difficult on exposed tops.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Soon dry A little drizzle over the high tops in cloud in the early morning, soon fading for dry hills.	Heavy rain develops, sets in Rain initially patchy, but likely becomes more persistent northwestern Eryri, then more widely, heavier falls developing, risk setting in continuously with time, lasting onward into evening.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Fairly extensive early, improving Most high terrain starts in cloud, bases towards middle slopes from Llyn Peninsula to Carneddau. Cloud will lift with time, breaks forming, soonest Berwyn group and increasingly widely. High Snowdon group summits will be slow to clear. Rising to 50%	Increasingly extensive Banks of low cloud over hills toward the west in the morning, some early breaks more north and eastern groups. Filling in and lowering widely in rain. 20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine increasingly breaks out. Good visibility, though a haze building.	Overcast, increasingly dull. Hazy, then widely poor visibility in rain
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	8 or 9C, later trending slightly cooler. Feeling near freezing at first on tops in wind. Above the summits.	9C rising to 12C. Feeling like -5C directly in wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 11 September, 2026

Changeable west-southwesterlies prevail through mid September; often windy, gale-force winds for periods over higher terrain. A window of drier weather this Friday, then the next frontal system sweeps in overnight into Saturday with a sustained fall of rain moving southeastward, accompanied by upland gales for most places. Improving for better weather on Sunday, then wind and rain returns into Monday, staying showery into Tuesday. A mixed outlook likely continues later next week with rain most frequent in western Scotland. Temperatures varying, some cooler days especially in Scotland, but often fairly mild further south, at times quite warm and humid.
