

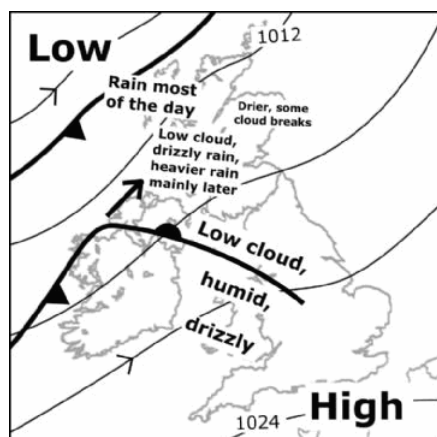

General Summary for Monday, 14 September, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 14 September, 2026

Humid southwesterly air brings extensive low cloud and drizzle to many mountains. Locally drier with some cloud breaks toward northeast of major mountain groups. Around Skye generally wet all day, whilst more prolonged heavier rain likely moves into southwest Scotland afternoon-evening. Strong and gusty winds.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Blustery, gusty; low cloud, drizzle, especially west.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 14 September, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 30 to 40mph, speeds generally rising in afternoon to 50mph on high tops, some notable strong gusts high passes and some downslopes.
Effect of wind on you?	Some variations, but often affecting comfortable walking, likely frequent buffeting over high mountains, very gusty in places affecting stability, not just highest terrain. Marked chill factor despite mild air.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Drizzly much of day west, some rain Drizzle and light rain in the west from dawn, periods of steady light rain over western hills, occasional heavier falls. Patchier small amounts further east, locally often dry. Onward into night, periods of more sustained heavy rain.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive very low cloud Blanket cloud shrouding the hills, from lower slopes upward toward Cardigan Bay, extensive above 400-500m even well inland, but some higher breaks locally north Carneddau to Bala/Berwyn groups, occasionally to upper slopes.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Below 10% west, local 30% north/east.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast and dull, misty or murky to lower slopes in west, local brighter areas north and easternmost areas.
How Cold? (at 900m)	14C, humid, little change all day, then starting to lower slightly into night. Feeling like 0 to 3C directly in the wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Eryri / Snowdonia National Park - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 15 September	Wednesday 16 September
How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 25 to 30mph, possibly 35-40mph just at first.	A gusty northwesterly 25-35mph, lessening somewhat and shifting westerly, later southwesterly 20-25mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery across the mountains, affecting comfortable walking with some buffeting in exposure and marked wind chill.	A blustery start, buffeting affecting stability in exposure and feeling chilly. Easing to fairly small effects.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Intermittent rain Overnight rain likely clears eastward around dawn. Then occasional showery rain, most common on western hills in the morning, brief heavier showers passing eastward during the day, may become more frequent.	Drizzle, some patchy rain Drizzly from the Llyn Peninsula towards Carneddau, to lower areas in the early morning, lifting to high terrain afternoon and increasingly breaking up. Some patchy rain too, this also breaking up. Little rain reaches Berwyn group.
Cloud on the hills?	Varying on higher tops Ragged cloud banks above 600-800m at first, soon mostly confined to 800-900m, but here may come and go for a few hours, some breaks forming at times	Extensive to start, improving Blanket cloud to at least most middle slopes to start, to lower slopes nearest Anglesey. Cloud more broken east of high tops but also misty on some low terrain too. Cloud lifts, to largely 800m and breaking up somewhat, though clinging to high tops.
Chance of cloud free summits?	40%	Rising to 40%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sun mostly toward east. Visibility often very good, briefly reduced in showers.	Patchy sun breaks out, most notably on lower slopes, high cloud from the west later. Good visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	8 to 11C, mildest early in day, trending cooler during daytime. Feeling close to 0C in the wind. Above the summits.	7 or 8C. Feeling near or below freezing in direct wind early. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 15 September, 2026**

Staying unsettled during the next week to 10 days as westerlies prevail - areas of low pressure passing north of Scotland with frontal systems bringing frequent rain, wettest over western mountains in Scotland. Often windy, sustained periods of gale-force westerly winds over higher terrain. Fairly cool by Tuesday onward, close to freezing on highest Scottish summits on Wednesday morning, possibly again for a time next weekend; often considerable wind chill on the mountains. Higher pressure and better weather tends to expand further north later in month.
