

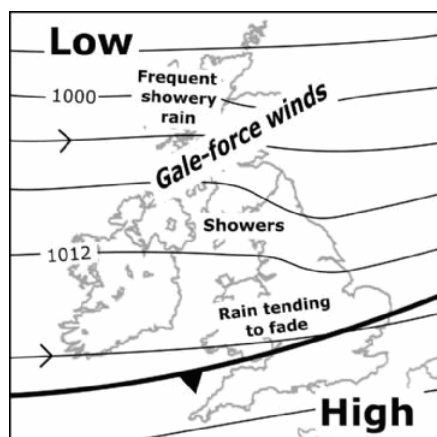

General Summary for Saturday, 19 September, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 19 September, 2026

Challenging conditions over high terrain with gale-force winds extensive; feeling notably cold in exposure. Showery rain, most frequent western Scotland. Persistent rain for Wales tends to clear southward and the strongest winds will lessen here.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Windy, gales for a time, lessening; patchy rain, light showers.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 19 September, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 35 to 45mph, strongest in the morning, easing during day to 25-30mph afternoon.
Effect of wind on you?	Strenuous-to-arduous walking conditions in the morning, frequent buffeting on high exposed terrain with considerable wind chill. Moderating, but still feeling blustery in exposure in afternoon.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Light rain mostly west in morning Mostly light showery rain and drizzle, some steadier rain on western hills particularly mid-Wales for a few hours early morning. Tending to fade to leave just patchy brief and light showers into afternoon.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting toward or above tops Fairly extensive cloud over higher slopes early in day, bases typically 600 to 800m, lowest in west, tending to rise with time, some higher breaks to 900m and above, more often toward Carneddau, Bala and Berwyn.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30% rising to 60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun, more common east Wales and more often afternoon. Slight haze especially toward coasts, reduced in rain, better east, becoming good.
How Cold? (at 900m)	7 to 9C, trending slightly cooler later in the daytime. Feeling like -2 to -5C directly in the wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Sunday 20 September	Monday 21 September
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Westerly 25-35mph early morning, tending to ease to 20mph. Blustery and chilly early in the day, affecting comfortable walking and balance on exposed tops, moderating.	Westerly 25-30mph early in day, very gusty in places, but speeds tending to lessen during day to 15mph or less. Breezy, affecting ease of walking and balance on exposed tops for a time, but likely becoming smaller.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Little or no rain Local drizzly showers possible over coastal hills early in day, but mostly dry. Toward evening, drizzly rain may return from the west.	A little drizzle Fine drizzle where in cloud feeling persistently damp, particularly western hills; drier toward the east.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Lifting and clearing, lowers later Patchy cloud above 700-800m in morning, most common near west coast. Lifting and clearing, but patches may come and go on higher western tops. If drizzle develops, cloud lowering back onto hills later. 60%	Lowest west, high tops may be clear Blanket cloud shrouding many western hills all day, to some lower slopes near Cardigan Bay. Highest tops may be near the top of the cloud sheet. Possibly more substantial breaks Carneddau and toward east. 30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Broken cloud and sunshine; high cloud tends to thicken to cover the sky. Some haze especially morning and evening, visibility very good for a time.	Some sun mostly develops in east and northernmost areas, in places may emerge into sunshine and clear air if above cloud, but staying misty poor visibility lower down.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	6 or 7C, little change all day, then tending to rise onward into night. Feeling sub-zero in early wind. Above the summits.	12 to 14C, little change into night; quite humid. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 20 September, 2026

Improving on Sunday as gale-force winds on Scottish mountains gradually lessen and showers become fewer. Warm and humid into early next week, on Monday extensive low cloud and drizzly rain particularly in the west. High pressure to the south will generally dominate the extended outlook particularly for England & Wales with more often drier and warmer conditions through late September into early October. Fine weather likely extends across Scotland for periods too, but a more changeable autumnal mix may continue especially further northwest with rain and stronger winds at times.

Forecast issued at 16:00 on Friday, 18 September, 2026
