

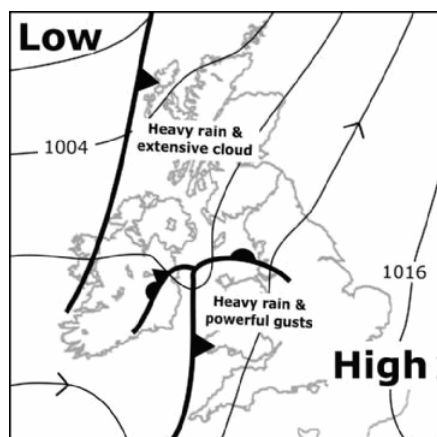

General Summary for Sunday, 27 September, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 27 September, 2026

Southerly winds up to gale-force on high terrain, including a swathe of particularly powerful winds and gusts moving across England & Wales during the day. Rain generally sets in from the west with some heavy falls, a band of more intense rain for a time. Cloud increasingly covering many hills.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Soon gales and severe gusts, rain moves in heavier.

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 27 September, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly 40mph soon from dawn, rising during morning, abruptly reaching 50-60mph, violent gusts over 70mph in places for an hour or so late morning to middle of day. Then W-SW'ly lessening quickly in afternoon to 30mph, later 20mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Increasingly difficult mobility over exposed terrain in the morning, challenging gusts widely for a few hours; notable wind chill. Then improving afternoon to become smaller later in day.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Heavy thundery rain for a time Mostly dry start, then rain develops quickly, setting in for several hours, a swathe of heavy rain likely into middle of day, briefly torrential, risk thunder. Breaking into showers afternoon, mostly in west. Drier toward evening.
Cloud on the hills?	Clear early hours, then covering high terrain Little or no cloud on hills at first. Patches starting to lower onto tops, suddenly filling in over high terrain afternoon, and lowering towards 500m locally during heaviest rain. Lifting again later.
Chance of cloud free summits?	80% lowering to 20% in rain
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Early weak sun soon gives way to overcast skies; brightening up again later in day. Very good visibility, deteriorating with cloud/rain, poor for a time.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9 or 10C, rising a degree afternoon, then notably cooling into night. Feeling like 0C in direct wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Monday 28 September	Tuesday 29 September
How windy? (On the summits)	West-southwesterly 10 to 20mph, strongest on northern tops in morning.	Southeasterly 40 to 60mph, turbulent gusts around high tops, passes and downslope.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small.	Challenging walking conditions on exposed terrain, but sudden buffeting also to some lower elevations.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain unlikely	Some drizzle, rain on and off Spots of rain from time to time, drizzly where in cloud; some pulses of rain spreading from the south, may become more constant falls on hills toward and west of Porthmadog.
Cloud on the hills?	Local patches lift and clear Some patchy cloud in the morning mainly on south-facing slopes near to coasts, plus local mist in some valleys around dawn inland. All lifting and dispersing for clear hills.	Most persistent eastern hills Banks of cloud most persistent over east and mid Wales, may cling around tops much of the day. Higher and more broken cloud north and northwestern areas. May tend to thin and disperse during day.
Chance of cloud free summits?	80%	40%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of cloud and sun; some early cloud in west, becoming sunnier near coast with time. Visibility excellent.	Some glimpses of weak sun through high cloud mostly northwest coastal areas. Hazy.
How Cold? (at 900m)	6C rising to 9C.	12 to 14C, feeling humid; then only slight drop onward into night.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 28 September, 2026

A changeable prospect during the week ahead. A better day on Monday as higher pressure expands in from the south, but showers and brisk winds continue toward northwest Scotland. Strong southeasterly winds by Tuesday, widely gales on mountains with turbulent downslope gusts toward the west; a risk of rain developing from the south during the day, becoming heavy later. Blustery south-southwesterlies into Wednesday and Thursday, showery in the west. Higher pressure tends to expand further north again into early October. Mostly mild temperatures.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Saturday, 26 September, 2026
