

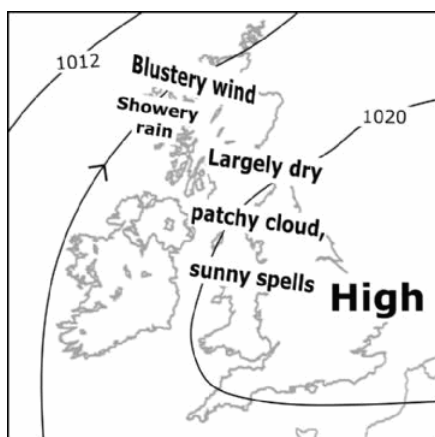

General Summary for Monday, 28 September, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 28 September, 2026

Breezy over Scottish mountains, windier further northwest, feeling chilly. Showery for western Lochaber, Mull and around Skye, tending to fade during afternoon. Largely dry elsewhere, varied cloud over hills in morning, lifting and breaking above many tops with some sunshine. Lighter winds for England & Wales.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Light wind until later. Patchy cloud clears hills, sunshine.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 28 September, 2026

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southwesterly 10 to 15mph, turning southerly 10mph or less, for much of the daytime, then later southeasterly, rising into evening to 15-20mph, strengthening into night to gusty 30mph. Mostly small during daytime.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain unlikely Small chance a very brief light shower near to the west coast in the morning.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Local patches lift and clear Some patchy cloud in the morning mainly on south-facing slopes near to coasts, plus local mist in some valleys around dawn inland. All lifting and dispersing for clear hills. 70% west early in day, rising above 90%.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of cloud and sun; some early cloud in west, becoming sunnier near coast with time. Visibility excellent.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	6C rising to 9C. Above the summits.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southeasterly 40 to 60mph, turbulent gusts around high tops, passes and downslope. Challenging walking conditions on exposed terrain, but sudden buffeting also to some lower elevations.	Southerly 30 to 40mph, at times 50mph over higher mountains particularly toward the west. Strenuous walking conditions, more challenging in places on exposed high terrain with frequent buffeting.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Some drizzle, rain on and off Spots of rain from time to time, drizzly where in cloud; some pulses of rain spreading from the south, may become more constant falls on hills toward and west of Porthmadog.	Frequent bursts of rain west A band of heavy rain from dawn soon clears northeastward, but clusters of heavy showers follow, merging to frequent rain west coastal areas, risk of thunder.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Most persistent eastern hills Banks of cloud most persistent over east and mid Wales, may cling around tops much of the day. Higher and more broken cloud north and northwestern areas. May tend to thin and disperse during day. 40%	Often capping tops, breaks north/east Cloud base lifting early morning with some breaks to upper slopes, but will often cap west coastal tops and vary in height all day; best breaks Carneddau to Bala area. 30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Some glimpses of weak sun through high cloud mostly northwest coastal areas. Hazy.	Intermittent sun breaking through mostly northern areas. Visibility varying, at times very good, but hazier coasts and reducing in rain.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	12 to 14C, feeling humid; then only slight drop onward into night. Above the summits.	Humid 13C or above from dawn, dropping during the day to a fresher 9C. Feeling near/below freezing in the wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 29 September, 2026**

Strong southeasterly winds by Tuesday, widely gales on mountains with turbulent downslope gusts toward the west; some rain developing from the south during the day, becoming heavy later - a band of rain moves northeast into early Wednesday, leaving blustery south-southwesterlies into Wednesday and Thursday, showery in the west. Some occasional rain further ahead, but more often looking drier as higher pressure tends to expand further north during early October. Mostly mild temperatures, some cooler nights develop.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Sunday, 27 September, 2026
