
Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Tuesday, 13 May, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 13 May, 2025

Strong warm sunshine for most places, very warm in western Scotland; beware sunburn and dehydration. Early fog draped around the north and east of Scotland and eastern Pennines, higher terrain above the fog, which will disperse back toward the North Sea coast. Gusty easterly winds England & Wales, locally southern Scotland.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Sunny and warm. Light to moderate breezes.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 13 May, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Easterly or variable 10mph or less. Some 15mph breezes southernmost areas. Increasing a little toward evening more widely to 15mph.	
Effect of wind on you?	Negligible	
How wet?	No rain expected most or all areas	
(Precipitation and its impact)	Late afternoon into early evening, remote risk of an isolated shower in central highlands mainly north toward Ben Alder area.	
Cloud on the hills?	Hills clear, dawn fog east soon dissipates	
	The hills widely clear, but from dawn patches of sea fog on lower easternmost slopes at dawn, also Ochils, soon all dispersing back to the coast. Into night, low cloud/fog rolls back in extensively from the east.	
Chance of cloud free Munros?	Practically certain	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive strong sunshine, some thin high cloud develops. Excellent visibility, fog on low ground toward south/east early in day.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	10 to 12C from dawn, rising to 15C, local warmer spots central highlands, slightly cooler east of Glenshee. Approaching 25C in glens near Loch Tay and the Trossachs.

How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills?	Early misty low cloud	Likely none
	Low cloud from North Sea fairly extensive from overnight to early morning, fog almost into glens, but most terrain above 1000m likely above this layer. Patches may drift upslope briefly, but all dispersing through middle of day.	Small chance local patches on easternmost hills early in day, all clearing.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	80% (some tops above early cloud)	Above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Strong sunshine increasingly widespread. Some thin high cloud. Visibility becoming excellent after early mist or haze lower down.	Extensive strong sunshine. Visibility excellent.
How Cold? (at 900m)	7C rising to 10C (cooler if in cloud lower down in morning); reaching locally 13C toward central highlands by afternoon.	7C rising locally up to 12C by afternoon, mainly Ben Lawers area; further east staying cooler all day.

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Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 14 May, 2025

High pressure persists toward the north of Britain this week and likely continuing through the weekend, bringing more dry, warm and sunny weather. East to northeasterly breezes prevail, gusty at times around some hills, mainly England and Wales. Some coastal fog and low cloud drifting inland from the North Sea will affect eastern areas in the early mornings, but largely dispersing through middle of daytimes. Highest temperatures typically toward the west. Very dry ground conditions, beware high risk of fire.

Forecast issued at 8:00 on Tuesday, 13 May, 2025
