

Southeastern Highlands

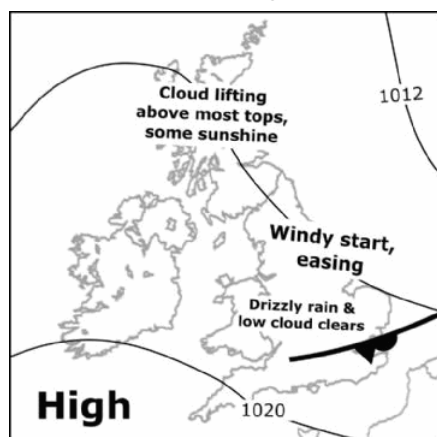
The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Tuesday, 10 June, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 10 June, 2025

A fine day developing as overnight rain fades and cloud banks lift and break to reveal patchy sunshine. Early strong breezes easing gradually. Patchy cloud may come and go on higher western tops in the Highlands. Slower to improve in south Wales.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Moderate breeze tending to ease. Cloud soon lifting from hills.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 10 June, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Westerly 15 to 20mph, occasional 25mph higher tops in morning. By later afternoon, easing a little to 10-15mph. Turning southwesterly into night, starting to increase a little to 20mph later in night. Fairly small, but feeling cool on higher terrain, blustery in places in the morning.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Substantially dry Pockets of light drizzle just around first light, possibly an isolated light shower into early morning, otherwise dry.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	Early cloud clears At dawn, varied banks of cloud from middle slopes upward morning west of A9. East of A9 may only see patches on high terrain. Lifting and breaking for often cloud-free hills by mid-morning, only fleeting caps on high tops if any. Soon 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Soon broken cloud and sun. Excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	4 or 5C at dawn, rising to 8 to 10C. Little change, or slight rise further after dark. Above the summits

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Wednesday 11 June	Thursday 12 June
How windy? (On the Munros)	Gusty southerly 20-25mph.	Southeasterly 25 to 40mph, gusts to 50mph, in places toward some lower elevations.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, though sudden strong gusts will challenge stability.	Very blustery, walking arduous on high terrain, affecting balance on exposed ridges, sudden buffeting gusts.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Little or no rain Small chance odd spots of drizzle early in day on high slopes near Callander/central Highlands.	Risk thundery rain developing Risk of occasional bursts of rain from elevated cloud layers, but possibly half the day or more may remain dry. Increasing threat with time of more widespread heavy rain developing from the south, risk thunderstorms.
Cloud on the hills?	Covering high terrain for a period Patchy cloud on middle-to-high terrain at dawn, filling in on high terrain in morning. Terrain above 900m west of A9 often in cloud for a few hours; patchy east of A9. May then all break up through afternoon.	Varied, may be little away from rain Possible cloud banks, risk more extensive for a time; then most cloud above the hills for many hours. Later if rain develops, banks of cloud filling in across the hills, in places to some lower slopes.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	30%, 50% east of A9; later 80%	70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun, more frequent east of A9. Excellent visibility when cloud breaks.	Weak sun and high cloud layers, becoming mainly overcast. Increasingly hazy.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9C, rising to 11 or 12C.	11C, small change with height at least in the morning, marginal rise afternoon.
Freezing Level	Above the summits	Above the summits

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 11 June, 2025

Much warmer and feeling humid as winds shift southerly through Wednesday. Low pressure to the west and a front pushing in brings a risk of thunderstorms on Thursday, soonest in Wales, advancing northeastwards over England and Scotland likely afternoon into evening - some uncertainty of timing. Low pressure is likely to linger later week into weekend - initially staying warm and humid, bringing an ongoing risk of thundery downpours, mixed with sunnier spells. Likely cooler and windier with time over the weekend. Southwesterlies then prevailing with rain at times, most over western mountains into early next week, but a trend toward higher pressure building from the south with drier conditions emerging.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Monday, 9 June, 2025
