
Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Friday, 13 June, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 13 June, 2025

Warm and fairly humid southerly winds will bring a few bursts of thundery rain northwards - ahead of more widespread thunderstorms reaching Wales in the evening and most other areas through the night. Some of the rain will be heavy.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Gusty winds; scattered bursts rain, chance thunder. Warm.

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 13 June, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southerly, speed fluctuating both in time and between adjacent slopes. Typically 25 to locally a very gusty 40mph morning. Will gradually ease afternoon and evening.	
Effect of wind on you?	Expect variable conditions, sudden gusts even on lower slopes may well make balance difficult. Fairly small later in day.	
How wet?	A few bursts of rain; small risk lightning	
(Precipitation and its impact)	In morning, perhaps patches drizzly rain and bursts of heavier rain. Gradually, becoming drier, although still the odd heavy, possibly thundery burst at any time.	
Cloud on the hills? Extensive but cloud base gradually rising		
Chance of cloud free Munros?	Varied conditions from dawn; cloud covering some slopes below 300m, perhaps widely. Will tend to improve with most cloud near or perhaps above 600m in afternoon, particularly west of A9 - but perhaps changing little near and east of Glenshee, and Ochils. 10%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sunshine coming through afternoon, mainly west of A9. Haze and mist mostly lifting (particularly west of A9) to give excellent visibility.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	11 to in afternoon 13C	
Freezing Level	Above the summits

	Saturday 14 June	Sunday 15 June
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	East later southerly 10mph, perhaps 20mph for a few hours morning when sudden gusts 40mph possible. Mostly small, but gusts, mainly near thunderstorms, perhaps sudden, could well unbalance you.	Westerly, varying between 15 and 25mph. Fairly small
How wet?	Periods of thundery rain	Little or no rain
(Precipitation and its impact)	Detail uncertain: Areas of thundery rain will move northwards, easing afternoon to scattered (perhaps still thundery) showers. Total rainfall very varied, in places within a few miles.	Drizzly rain possible here and there - but the day substantially dry.
Cloud on the hills?	Generally very extensive, although some breaks to the tops near the coast	Unlikely to lift above higher summits all day
	Frequently or persistently foggy, particularly morning. Fog sometimes from just above the valleys upward. May improve at times, possibly extensively by evening when possible breaks toward 900m.	Cloud base will tend to rise, by afternoon mostly 750 to 900m west of A9 and above 1000m further east.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	10%	20% west of A9 to in afternoon 80% near and east of Glenshee
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Cloudy or dull and misty much of the day, particularly away from western summits.	Patches of sun, particularly near and east of Glenshee. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9 to 12C warmest western summits afternoon.	11C
Freezing Level	Above the summits	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 14 June, 2025

Colder air from the west will reach all areas by Sunday. However, low cloud probably very extensive on western mountains, together with drizzly showers. Most of next week will be dry and increasingly warm, but western Scotland will still have occasional rain as weakening fronts affect particularly coastal mountains. By mid week it should be fine everywhere - although it may not last through the following weekend.
