

Southeastern Highlands

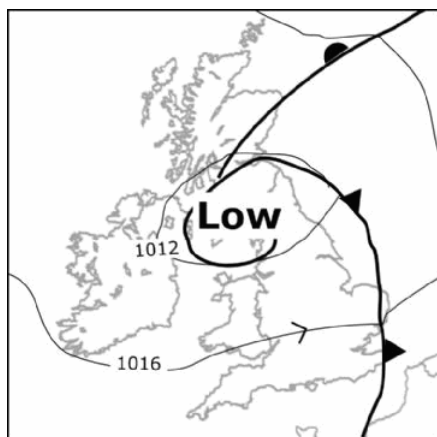
The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Erich, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Saturday, 14 June, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 14 June, 2025

Varied across Britain through the day, particularly England and Wales, where some sunshine will be interspersed with rain (including thunderstorms), low cloud and changes in wind speed and direction. Changes slower in Scotland where broadly a band of thundery rain will move northwards.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Thundery rain and low cloud.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 14 June, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Direction and speed varied. Speed often 15mph or less, but for periods, a sometimes gusty 30mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small, but gusts, mainly near thunderstorms, perhaps sudden, could well unbalance you.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Thundery rain morning; then slowly fizzling out. Morning: Thundery rain soon enveloping region from south after dawn. morning (dry temporarily). Afternoon onwards: heavy bursts becoming infrequent, initially near central belt and Angus and occasionally ceasing.
Cloud on the hills?	Soon very extensive Soon frequent or persistent fog, sometimes from just above the valleys upward. May improve at times later in day, possibly extensively by evening when perhaps breaks toward 900m.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	Soon 10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Cloudy or dull and misty much of the day.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9C.
Freezing Level	Above the summits

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Sunday 15 June	Monday 16 June
How windy? (On the Munros)	Westerly, 25mph.	Between southwest and west; 30mph - perhaps 35mph higher summits.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small	Expect increasing buffeting with height: walking often arduous where exposed on highest areas. Considerable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Little or no rain Drizzly rain possible here and there - but the day substantially dry.	Rain unlikely
Cloud on the hills?	Unlikely to lift above higher summits all day Cloud base will tend to rise, by afternoon mostly 750 to 900m west of A9 and above 1000m further east.	Cloud base rising to or above highest summits Higher areas extensively covered morning, but cloud base rising. From midday, typically 800 to 1050m.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20% west of A9 to in afternoon 80% near and east of Glenshee	60% by afternoon
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patches of sun, particularly near and east of Glenshee. Very good visibility.	Patchwork of sunshine and very good visibility; most sun east of Glenshee and Ochils.
How Cold? (at 900m)	8 to 11C - coldest west of A9 morning	9 to 12C warmest afternoon.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Will feel only just above freezing point directly in the wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 15 June, 2025

Colder air from the west will reach all areas by Sunday. However, low cloud still extensive on western mountains, together with drizzly showers. Little rainfall most of next week and increasingly warm, although western Scotland colder with occasional rain as weakening fronts affect particularly the NW Highlands. By mid week it should be fine everywhere - although it may not last into the following weekend.
