

Southeastern Highlands



General Summary for Friday, 10 October, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 10 October, 2025

Drizzly and cloudy in west Scotland, dry with well broken cloud to the east; strong gusty winds central and northern Scotland. Morning low cloud fairly extensive across England, largely clearing the Pennines - Lakeland fells will struggle to clear. A foggy start in Wales with drizzle on west slopes; breaks to many tops forming.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Breezy with strong gusts; cloud well-broken east

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 10 October, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Westerly 25 to 35mph. Gusty in places, particularly high ground and down eastern slopes in the morning, risk up to 45mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Affecting comfortable walking, more strenuous on high terrain with buffeting gusts over high ground, locally downslope. Marked wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Little or no rain Rare pockets of fine drizzle towards the central highlands.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly persistent central highlands; improving east Banks of cloud above 600-800m towards the central highlands and near Loch Tay. Some highest tops may be near top of the cloud layer. Well broken east and largely above 700m. Tending to lift with some breaks forming, hills east of A9 becoming often clear.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	40%, rising to 70% east of A9
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Some glimpses of sun east of high tops in the central highlands. Often sunny west of A9. A slight haze on lower slopes, but visibility excellent on high terrain out of cloud.
How Cold? (at 900m)	5 to 7C, little change with added height to higher summits. Mountains near and east of Glenshee warming slightly, locally to 9C. Feeling like -5C in the stronger wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Westerly 15mph, very locally gusty 25mph around some slopes, not just on highest terrain. Easing later. Fairly small, but some local sudden gusty spots which may start to affect balance around higher mountains.	Variable 10mph or less. Some local gustiness. Negligible.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain expected	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	Mostly upper slopes towards central highlands Cloud most extensive on mountains in central highlands, bases 700-800m in the morning, plus some local mist in glens at first. Highest summits near top of the cloud layer. Cloud rising a little with breaks forming, exposing many eastern slopes. 50%	Patchy cloud banks lift to high slopes From in the glens and corries in the morning with banks up to middle and higher slopes. Fog will dissipate but cloud patches linger above 600m - some high tops towards central highlands above the cloud. Cloud may be more sheet-like east of A9. 50% highest tops of central highlands above cloud
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Fairly cloudy, occasional sun, best east. Visibility good below cloud.	A patchwork of cloud and sun, at times more overcast. Excellent visibility above cloud, some lower haze.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	7 to 9C from dawn, may rise up to 11C in the east. Little change with added height. Above the summits	8 or 9C, may rise slightly. Increasing temperature with height. Above the summits

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 11 October, 2025

Westerly winds with some drizzle over high ground prevails in northern Scotland into Saturday, then high pressure establishes over the British Isles bringing light winds and dry weather conditions well into next week. Scope for inversion conditions this weekend and early next week with some valley fog and varied low cloud. Into the week, mixed cloud and sun with occasional longer spells of cloud or sunshine. Easterly winds are expected to increase with time for England and Wales, particularly in the south where there could be notable gusts over high terrain. Pleasant daytime temperatures, some cooler nights with slight frost where skies are clear.

Forecast issued at 16:13 on Thursday, 9 October, 2025
