

Southeastern Highlands

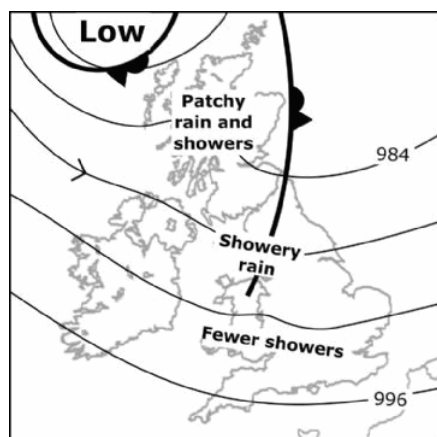
The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Erich, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Tuesday, 21 October, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 21 October, 2025

Patchy rain drifts east across the Highlands, breaking up into showers. Staying showery all day toward west coast, locally more frequent rain. Showery rain throughout the day for England and Wales, occasionally heavy. Low cloud most persistent west. Increasingly windy, feeling cold.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Wind strengthening. Rain mostly west, showers, cloud on tops.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 21 October, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southwesterly, 15-20mph or less in morning. Abrupt switch westerly middle of day (into afternoon in east) and increasing, soonest in western areas, 30-35mph, gusts later 40mph higher tops.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, much of morning in east, but becoming increasingly blustery higher areas. Afternoon onward more arduous over tops, significant wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy rain, brief showers Rain on and off in the morning, more persistent for a time central highlands, pushing eastwards and fading with time. Then a few areas of showers. More often dry further east.
Cloud on the hills?	Most extensive west, rising a little Covering higher terrain fairly widely in morning above 700-900m, lowest around rain west of the A9. Base rising a little toward upper slopes, some breaks forming, but cloud likely to often cap high tops.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20% rising to 40%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, a little sun breaking through mostly eastern hills. Visibility poor in rain, especially morning in west. Becoming locally good afternoon.
How Cold? (at 900m)	5 or 6C, dropping later in day to 3C. Feeling like -5C in the strengthening wind, later in day nearer -10C high tops.
Freezing Level	Above the summits, then dropping close to highest tops above 1200m evening into night.

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Wednesday 22 October	Thursday 23 October
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	West or southwesterly 15 to 25mph, possibly 30mph at times high tops. Fairly small, but feeling blustery on exposed higher tops, may affect balance on some ridges. Marked wind chill.	High uncertainty - a possible sustained lull, but may rapidly increase, mostly W-SW'ly 30mph, risk reaching 40-50mph. Possibly staying small, but beware of difficult conditions developing bringing significant wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rare if any precipitation Chance of an odd brief light shower, or snow flurry on highest Munros.	Possible rain / high-level snow west Largely dry conditions may last much of the day in eastern areas. Risk of showery rain, or falling as snow on higher Munros, mostly central highlands, may develop further and become frequent.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	Patches high tops, good breaks Occasional cloud grazing higher slopes, mostly above 900-1000m, most common central highlands. Further east, cloud often above higher summits. 60%	Mostly higher and western hills Often capping higher western summits in the central highlands, filling in more widely in precipitation. Further east, cloud higher and some breaks to the tops. 50%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Fairly cloudy, some sun, best in east. Visibility excellent.	Occasional sun east, cloudier west. Visibility excellent where dry, but reducing locally to poor if precipitation develops.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	2 or 3C. Feeling like -5C, nearer -8C high summits in the wind. Just above highest summits, 1200m or slightly higher.	2 or 3C. If wind speed increases, chill factor feeling near -10C. 1100 to 1200m.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 22 October, 2025

A complex weather situation through midweek, with various centres of low pressure drifting around slowly. Areas of rain and showers, but also drier moments - Wednesday and possibly Thursday often dry in eastern Scotland and northern England - beware of a deterioration from the northwest during Thursday with gales and rain setting in. Significantly colder later in the week as winds turn northerly. Freezing level dropping to 800-1000m into the weekend, lowest in northern Scotland. A mix of sunshine and showers falling as snow on high terrain, most frequent in north-facing areas.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Monday, 20 October, 2025
