

Southeastern Highlands

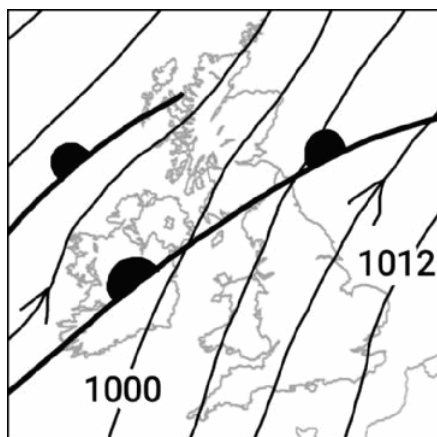
The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Erich, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Tuesday, 4 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 4 November, 2025

Strong to gale-force south to south-westerly winds bringing frequent rainfall and extensive hill fog once more, especially across England and Wales, and into western and southern parts of Scotland. Drier, with the best cloud breaks, towards north Highland and northern Cairngorm NP.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Fairly extensive hill fog and patches of drizzle. Gales will ease down.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 4 November, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	South to higher up southwesterly 40 to perhaps 50mph for a time. Easing down to 20 to 30mph in afternoon.
Effect of wind on you?	Continued difficult conditions in morning where exposed on higher areas, where wind chill significant and walking a struggle. Easing into afternoon.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy rain and drizzle Rain and drizzle on and off through the day.
Cloud on the hills?	Mountains persistently foggy Widely persistent fog above 400 to 600m, perhaps 800m Ochils and near and east of Glenshee (confidence low).
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun, mainly lower slopes Angus and Ochils. Otherwise, mostly dull and misty.
How Cold? (at 900m)	8C Will feel as cold as minus 4C directly in the wind in morning.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Wednesday 5 November	Thursday 6 November
How windy? (On the Munros)	Variable wind directions are expected, often 10-15mph or less, but may lift to become southerly 15 to 20mph later.	Southerly 25 to 35mph
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small	Blustery, perhaps at times arduous over higher terrain. Marked chill where exposed to the wind.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain easing for a time, returning later. Patches of rain and drizzle from dawn, but tending to fizzle out for a time. Later in the afternoon, or perhaps into the evening, risk of more rain returning from south.	Patches of rain and drizzle Patches of drizzle on and off through the day, perhaps some heavier rain at dawn from an overnight front, but soon clearing north. Steadier rain perhaps later again.
Cloud on the hills?	Widespread and to very low bases Low cloud will blanket the hills in fog, down to the very lowest slopes across southern ranges.	Extensive Within a humid atmosphere, cloud banks will cover hills widely, but to varying levels. Scope for northern hills to see breaks, perhaps between cloud layers.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	10%	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast. Visibility often poor due to rain.	Mostly overcast. Visibility rather hazy, and poor in drizzle.
How Cold? (at 900m)	6 to 8C	8C
Freezing Level	Above the summits	Above the summits

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 5 November, 2025

Remaining very unsettled with as a series of deep Atlantic lows, and their associated fronts, continue to cross Britain over the next week. Frequently windy, with high rainfall, particularly on western mountains (rain at some stage almost daily) and cloud will frequently cover higher areas. Only rarely cold enough for snow higher mountains in Scotland.

Forecast issued at 14:28 on Monday, 3 November, 2025
