
## **Southeastern Highlands**

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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## General Summary for Friday, 7 November, 2025



# British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 7 November, 2025

Cloud and drizzle in central and south Scotland, clearer hills (including some summits) north. Blustery coasts from Skye southward, Wales breezy too. A cloud sheet will cover English and Welsh peaks with low bases on south aspects. Rain over south Wales through afternoon, risk of afternoon rain for the Pennines.

## Detailed Forecast for Friday, 7 November, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southerly 15-20mph with stronger gusts over tops at times. Trending southeasterly through the day, particularly lower slopes.		
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small		
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Some patchy rain and drizzle, mostly early  A chance of patchy rain west of the A9, particularly early where rain may be heavy for a periods. Afternoon likely substantially dry. Some drizzle on the high tops in fog at times.		
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive, some variability		
	Fairly extensive across middle and upper slopes much of the day. Base will vary, rising somewhat after dawn with a few breaks mixed in, though returning to lower slopes too. Highest bases from Loch Tay to Loch Ericht, though unlikely above 700m.		
Chance of cloud free Munros?	10%		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	No sun expected. Visibility variable with cloud base, though excellent when out of cloud.		
How Cold? (at 900m)	7 to 8C, some locally warmer areas on northern aspects near Glenshee. Also locally starting cooler from Callander northward to Loch Ericht.

How windy? (On the Munros)  Effect of wind on you?	Southeast trending southerly, 15 to 25mph, occasionally 30mph around higher summits, stronger later; locally varied.  Feeling breezy over higher terrain, but mostly modest effect on walking; some gustier locations more noticeable.	Southwesterly 30-35mph. Rising for several afternoon hours to a gusty 40-45mph.  Strenuous-to-arduous walking with considerable buffeting and wind chill.  Most significant effects afternoon.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	A little drizzle  Some morning patchy rain soon clears followed by pockets of drizzle, mostly over southern slopes. Possibly odd patches of rain occasionally toward west.	Patchy rain, more frequent west later Patchy rain west of the A9. Rain becomes more frequent afternoon, may set in for several hours. Some patches starting to drift further east.
Cloud on the hills?	Likely extensive, varied fog layers  Shrouding the hills most or all day, some different fog layers possible, including some lower slopes in the morning. Above 600m likely staying covered, locally breaks to 800m Loch Tay, mainly northern slopes.	Extensive  Cloud shrouds nearly all mountains from 600m upward, bases locally lower towards the southern and eastern lowlands.

Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Rare if any weak sun. Mostly misty at various levels.	Overcast. Visibility largely poor in fog and rain; locally excellent in the east early.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	7C from dawn, lowering to 5 or 6C.  Above the summits	5 or 6C, coolest in central highlands early. Northern areas may rise to 7C. Feeling like -3 to -5C in direct wind. Above the summits

## **Planning Outlook**

#### All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 8 November, 2025

A brief brighter spell on Saturday, but otherwise staying mild with low cloud, drizzle and rain at times well into next week. Areas northeast of major hill groups seeing least rain and highest cloud breaks, though high summits will struggle to clear the fog as the air will remain generally humid. Southerly winds of varied strengths, sometimes more blustery, approaching gale-force in exposed western areas.

As the following weekend approaches, indications of northeasterly winds developing for Scotland, bringing drier weather to the west, and potentially much colder with time. England & Wales may remain frequently wet under slow-moving low pressure - uncertainty over timing and locations of the coldest conditions.
