
Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Monday, 10 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 10 November, 2025

Heavy rain for much of the Highlands from dawn into the morning, moving northwards, clearing to leave patchy rain, local showers in west; cloud base rising. Some showery rain in the Lakes, drier Pennines. Showers in Wales merging into clusters of heavy rain. Moderate to locally gusty southerly winds.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Rain clears, cloud base rising. Gusty wind in places.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 10 November, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southeast soon southerly, 20-25mph, risk gusty 30mph higher tops toward east for periods.	
Effect of wind on you?	Feeling noticeably blustery on exposed tops and ridges, may start to affect ease of walking in places; marked wind chill.	
How wet?	Early rain clearing, drier into afternoon	
(Precipitation and its impact)	Bursts of rain soon fairly widespread from dawn, persistent for a few hours in the morning. Breaking up to leave patchy rain into middle of day, fading to be often in afternoon, an odd shower possible.	
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive, then rising to upper slopes	
	Blanket cloud across the hills from dawn into morning. Cloud base rising toward upper slopes, some breaks into afternoon, though likely to come and go above 800-900m.	
Chance of cloud free Munros?	Below 10% in rain, 30% afternoon.	
Sunshine?	Cloudy, poor visibility during morning rain.	
Air clarity (below cloud)	Improving visibility, a little sun breaking through afternoon.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	4 or 5C. Feeling below freezing if exposed to wind, nearer -5C on highest summits.

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Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 11 November	Wednesday 12 November
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	South or southeasterly, likely to strengthen during daytime, 20 to 40mph, gusty; risk 45-50mph afternoon-evening. Expect increasingly arduous conditions, affecting comfortable walking, very gusty, locally downslope toward north.	Speed and direction may vary considerably, possibly a lull developing. SW'ly 20-30mph mostly morning. May become mostly small, but risk more blustery for several hours.
How wet?	Increasingly heavy rain	A little drizzly rain
(Precipitation and its impact)	Dry start, but rain spreading in from the south, becoming widely persistent, increasingly heavier falls setting in afternoon, soonest central highlands.	Very wet underfoot with streams in spate and flooding following previous rain. Small amounts of drizzly rain during daytime, may fade out to be drier.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive, lowering	Fairly extensive
	Any early breaks short-lived, banks of cloud already likely covering most hills. Lowering to extensively blanket the hills from lower elevations upward, particularly more southern slopes.	Shrouding the mountains widely, banks of cloud at varied elevations, in places to some lower slopes. Higher bases and local breaks toward east, best in afternoon.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	10%	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast increasingly murky with poor visibility widely in rain.	Largely cloudy, a little weak sun may break through. Misty areas in morning, improving visibility, locally good in east.
How Cold? (at 900m)	3C rising into afternoon to 5C, then from dusk 7C; only small fall with height. Feeling like -5C directly in the wind.	4C, may drop slightly during day. Feeling like -5C if in stronger wind.
Freezing Level	Close to highest summits overnight, but by dawn well above the tops.	Above the summits, but may drop close to higher tops later in day, then lowering further to 1000m or lower into night.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 11 November, 2025

Unsettled south-southwesterlies through midweek, periods of heavy rain widespread, further flooding for Wales, the Lakes and southwest Scotland. Mountain gales on Tuesday for England, Wales, S & E Scotland. Cooler than recently in Scotland, but still generally mild England and Wales by day and night.

Later in the week, colder air pushes into Scotland, dropping below freezing over the mountains, with some snow over higher terrain in the Highlands on Thursday-Friday; strong to gale force easterly winds develop widely. Colder northeasterly air is expected to become more widespread into the weekend and next week.

Forecast issued at 16:00 on Sunday, 9 November, 2025
