
# Southeastern Highlands

## General Summary for Wednesday, 19 November, 2025



# British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 19 November, 2025

Strong to gale-force northerly winds; severe chill factor on the mountains. Terrain widely frozen with fresh snow cover. Snow and hail showers frequent in the northern Highlands. Showers also north/west Wales. From the central Highlands into northern England, generally dry with sunshine and very clear air.

#### **Headline for Southeastern Highlands**

Bitterly cold; wind up to gale-force. Mostly sunny.

# Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 19 November, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Northerly 30 to 45mph, strongest sustained speeds over eastern tops.	
Effect of wind on you?	Often challenging walking conditions on higher exposed terrain, significant wind chill, severe in places higher up.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Snow showers mostly toward east	
	Occasional snow and hail showers coming in from the north, mostly affecting areas east of Glenshee. Snow lying into glens.  Often dry much of the central highlands, rare brief showers.	
Cloud on the hills?	Patches on tops mostly toward northeast	
	Patchy cloud sometimes drifting over upper slopes, but often breaking above many summits, clearest near central belt. Cloud banks come and go more often over upper slopes near and east of Lochnagar.	
Chance of cloud free Munros?	50% east of Glenshee, 70% elsewhere.	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine frequent many areas, more cloud furthest east. Visibility mostly excellent, locally reduced if in showers, risk intermittently very poor near Lochnagar.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	-4 or -5C (to -7C on higher summits). Wind chill feeling like -20C in stronger speeds.	
Freezing Level	Terrain widely frozen from glens upward, only slight rise above freezing point on some lower slopes.

#### Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Thursday 20 November	Friday 21 November
How windy? (On the Munros)	Northerly 35 to 50mph from dawn, strongest high eastern tops, gradually lessening from west toward 25mph.	West later southwesterly, strengthening during daytime - some uncertainty of timing - 25 to 40mph, risk later 50mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Continuing challenging conditions with significant wind chill, severe higher mountains; improving soonest west.	Expect conditions to deteriorate, with time more strenuous, risk later difficult on higher mountains, significant wind chill.
How wet?	Local snow showers east	Snow moving in from west
(Precipitation and its impact)	Continued snow and hail showers coming in from the north affecting areas near/east of Glenshee, particularly morning. Snow lying into glens.  Often dry much of the central highlands.	Likely dry start, possibly largely dry in easternmost areas all daylight. Snow flurries likely to develop from west, risk becoming persistent central highlands. Likely after dark, rain at lower elevations.
Cloud on the hills?	Small amounts west, some banks east	Mostly little, later lowers from west
	Patchy cloud sometimes drifting over upper slopes, but often breaking above many summits near and west of the A9. More common cloud banks over upper slopes near and east of Lochnagar in the morning.	Patchy mist some glens and perhaps corries at first, otherwise hills largely clear, possibly much of the daytime. With time, patchy cloud lowering onto tops from west, risk more extensive from dusk.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	70%, to 40% easternmost areas.	80% later dropping to 40%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine frequent many areas, more cloud furthest east. Visibility mostly excellent, locally reduced if in showers.	Sun through high cloud in morning becoming weak, then obscured. Visibility excellent, reducing if snow develops, possibly poor later in west.
How Cold? (at 900m)	-4C (to -6C highest summits). Wind chill feeling like -15 to -20C, coldest in stronger speeds in morning.	-2 or -3C, slow rise, by evening up to 0C. In stronger wind feeling like -15C.
Freezing Level	Terrain widely frozen from glens upward, only partial thawing lowest sunlit slopes.	Much terrain frozen all day to lower slopes, but later in day likely to start rising just above freezing at lower elevations.

### **Planning Outlook**

#### All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 20 November, 2025

Prepare for winter conditions - snow covering many mountains to lower slopes in Scotland, snow and ice cover varied for England & Wales, but much terrain frozen; hard frosts into inland valleys and glens the next couple of nights. Continuing strong northerlies into Thursday, showery snow and hail gradually fading from northwest Scotland. A front moving into Scotland from the west on Friday brings gales and snow, turning to rain lower down - in England & Wales more likely develops Friday evening-night. Less cold into the weekend, but higher mountains stay near or just below freezing, particularly Scotland; showers or locally more frequent upland snow over several days forward.

#### Forecast issued at 16:00 on Tuesday, 18 November, 2025
