
Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Saturday, 29 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 29 November, 2025

Snow showers toward northern Scotland, but much of the Highlands will be dry - sunshine and cloud breaks best toward southwest; sub-zero on tops, chilly northerly breeze. England and Wales sees rain fairly widely, snow falling on higher tops; wind very variable, but risk gales developing.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Cold and breezy, but generally dry, broken cloud, some sun.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 29 November, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Northerly, 15 to 25mph, tending to increase a little, more often 30mph toward dusk, 35mph at times into evening eastern tops.		
Effect of wind on you?	Be prepared for significant wind chill in exposure on higher terrain, feeling blustery on the tops.		
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Generally dry Chance of an isolated brief flurry, mainly toward the north. Late evening into night, risk snow becoming more frequent from north.		
Cloud on the hills?	Patches mainly confined to tops		
	Cloud cover variable across area, but tending to come and go across higher tops mostly above 900-1000m, breaks more frequent areas toward the central belt.		
Chance of cloud free Munros?	60%		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Variable cloud and occasional sun. Visibility very good.		
How Cold? (at 900m)	-2C. Feeling like -10C if exposed to stronger wind.		
Freezing Level	600 to 700m.		

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Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Sunday 30 November	Monday 1 December
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Northeasterly 15 to 25mph, dropping light and variable. Then likely to strengthen southerly into night to 50mph. Marked wind chill in exposure for a time, particularly in east, but becoming small. Deteriorating onward into night.	Uncertain forecast: Southerly - a possible lull after overnight gales, but risk a sudden increase again during day to 50mph. Small perhaps for a few hours in morning, but risk of conditions worsening again to give difficult walking.
How wet?	Rare if any flurries	Rain and hill snow likely develops
(Precipitation and its impact)	Chance of an odd snow flurry areas near and east of Lochnagar.	Overnight hill snow finishing mainly as rain toward higher slopes, fading by dawn. Largely dry for a few hours, but risk further persistent rain soon setting in from south, turning back to snow on tops.
Cloud on the hills?	Some local cloud banks, mainly east	Fairly extensive, lowering
	Patchy cloud around some higher slopes and corries, mainly more eastern mountains, tending to thin and break. Some mist around corries or into glens central highlands.	Banks of cloud shrouding many hills, risk extensive to mid-slopes in south-facing areas, some local breaks north of major hill groups for a time. Lowering widely as rain/snow develops.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	60%	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Partly cloudy skies especially in east, some sunshine further south and west, then thin high cloud builds from west later. Visibility excellent.	Largely overcast, dull in rain. Visibility locally may be good out of cloud for a time in morning, but then poor in rain/snow.
How Cold? (at 900m)	-2C, small variation with height. Feeling nearer -10C if exposed to breeze.	1 or 2C, later 0C. Feeling like -10C or below if exposed to stronger winds.
Freezing Level	Much terrain frozen with frost into glens, only partial thawing lowest sunlit slopes up to around 400-500m.	Rising up to dawn, to around 1100-1200m, briefly higher. Tending to drop later to around 900-1000m.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 30 November, 2025

After a lull on Sunday, areas of low pressure then circulating to the west and north will dominate the weather pattern into next week, bringing generally unsettled weather. Southwesterly air and briefly milder into Monday, with rain for most places at times, but prolonged heavier rain for England and Wales. Then typically cooler with showery conditions - higher mountains near or just below freezing point likely for the remainder of the week - some snow on tops, occasional hail. Wind speed likely to vary, some squally gusty spells, but also some lulls possible during the week ahead.
