
Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Sunday, 30 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 30 November, 2025

A fine day for many places, sunshine and broken cloud. Much terrain frozen in the Highlands, where a lull in wind, later strengthening southerlies in west. Strong northwesterlies for England and Wales tend to drop. Some local showers move inland from the Irish Sea. Deteriorating all areas into night.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Chilly wind eases; increases into night. Patchy cloud and sun.

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 30 November, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Northerly 15 to 25mph, strongest in east at dawn, dropping light and variable. Then from dusk starting to strengthen southerly, into night to 50mph.	
Effect of wind on you?	Marked wind chill in exposure early in day, particularly in east, but becoming small. Deteriorating onward into night.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its	Rare if any flurries; snow/rain into night Fresh snow cover mainly eastern areas from overnight. Chance of an odd snow flurry	
impact)	areas near and east of Lochnagar early morning, fading out; otherwise dry. Onward into night, snow develops from west, but turning increasingly to rain higher up later in night, heaviest central highlands.	
Cloud on the hills?	Some local cloud banks, mainly east	
	Patchy cloud around some higher slopes and corries, mainly more eastern mountains, tending to thin and break. Some mist around corries or into glens central highlands.	
Chance of cloud free Munros?	60%	
Sunshine?	Partly cloudy skies especially in east, some sunshine further south and west, then thin	
Air clarity (below cloud)	high cloud builds from west later. Visibility excellent away from cloud patches.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	-2C, small variation with height. Rising onward into night. Feeling nearer -10C if exposed to wind early morning.	
Freezing Level	Much terrain frozen with frost into glens, only partial thawing lowest sunlit slopes up to around 400-500m. Then into night starting to rise variably to upper slopes.	

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Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southerly or variable; overnight gales ease, typically 20-30mph or less; risk gales returning later, perhaps before dusk.	South to southwesterly 25mph, to at times 30-35mph highest tops.
Effect of wind on you?	Most likely fairly small for half the day or more, but beware possibility of worsening conditions toward or beyond sunset.	Blustery, starting to affect comfortable walking on exposed higher areas. Noticeable wind chill.
How wet?	Rain and hill snow likely returns	Rare showers
(Precipitation and its impact)	Overnight hill snow finishing mainly as rain toward higher slopes, fading toward dawn. Largely dry for a few hours, but risk further persistent rain soon setting in from south, turning back to snow on tops.	Local brief showers mostly in the Callander area, with snow above 800m.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive, lowering	Fairly extensive, varied low cloud
	Banks of cloud shrouding many hills, risk extensive to mid-slopes in south-facing areas, some local breaks north of major hill groups for a time. Lowering widely as rain/snow develops.	Often covering higher slopes, but some varied low cloud banks, on south-facing slopes to some lower elevations particularly in morning. Some breaks forming to 900m, mostly north of Loch Tay.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20%	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely overcast, dull in rain. Visibility locally may be good out of cloud for a time in morning, but then poor in rain/snow.	Glimpses of sun mostly eastern hills. Visibility very good below cloud.
How Cold? (at 900m)	2 or 3C, then into night nearer 0C. Feeling like -10C or below if exposed to stronger winds.	0 or 1C. Wind chill feeling like -7 to -10C.
Freezing Level	Rising up to dawn, above the summits for a few hours. Tending to drop afternoon to 1200m, then 1000m after dark.	900 to 1000m

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 1 December, 2025

Areas of low pressure circulating to the west and north will dominate the weather pattern in the week ahead, bringing generally unsettled weather. Southwesterly air and briefly milder into Monday - prolonged heavy rain for England and Wales bringing renewed concern for flooding. Then typically cooler with showery conditions - higher mountains near or just below freezing point likely for the remainder of the week - some snow on tops, occasional hail. Wind speed likely to vary, some squally gusty spells, but also some lulls possible during the week.

Forecast issued at 7:00 on Sunday, 30 November, 2025
