

Southeastern Highlands

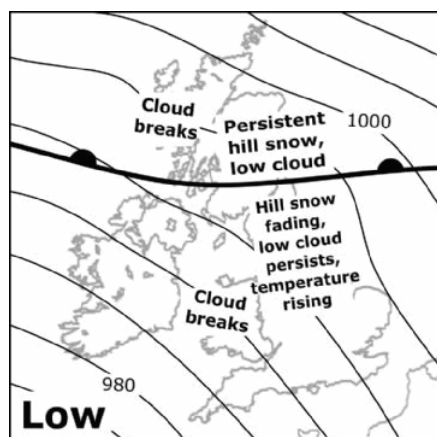

General Summary for Wednesday, 4 February, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 4 February, 2026

Easterly winds gale force across northern Scotland, easing further south. Ongoing snowfalls over E & SE Highlands, sleet or rain lower down; low cloud and whiteout over hills. Early sleet or snow over northern England fades, but low cloud lingers. Largely dry much of Wales, clearer hills west, but increasingly windy.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Gales ease. Persistent snow and low cloud, whiteout.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 4 February, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros)	Easterly 40 to 50mph, strongest early morning, very gusty for a time, peak speeds tending to lessen, may drop below 30mph into afternoon.
Effect of wind on you?	Challenging conditions with frequent buffeting gusts and significant wind chill, some improvement with time.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Snow continuing, sleet/rain lower down Snow fairly persistent across the hills, most continuous in east; sleet or rain lower slopes, locally varied up to 500m by afternoon, particularly west. Into night, turning to sleet or rain to some higher elevations.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive Cloud shrouding many hills from mid slopes upward, highest bases and local breaks possible near and northwest of Loch Tay.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast and dull or misty. Whiteout over tops in fog and snow.
How Cold? (at 900m)	-2 or -3C, rising slightly during day, toward 0C into the night. Wind chill feeling like -12 to -17C.
Freezing Level	400m to 600m, typically highest further west, locally variable, tending to rise slightly during day, above 800m into night.

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Thursday 5 February	Friday 6 February
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Easterly 45 to 60mph, typically strongest central highlands, risk 70mph, sudden powerful gusts near major summits. Difficult mobility, violent gusts may knock you over in places. Significant wind chill, severe over high terrain.	Easterly 45-50mph, to nearer 60mph around higher summits, local powerful gusts downslope west of high tops. Difficult mobility on high terrain, buffeting gusts knocking you off balance some lower slopes. Severe wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Snow mostly eastern hills Snow flurries, more frequent or fairly persistent over hills east of the A9, mostly rain at first below 500-600m, but becoming snow to lowering elevations in east. Patchier toward west of Loch Tay.	Snow most continuous east Snow frequent, or more persistent east of the A9, intermittent flurries toward and northwest of Loch Tay; sleet or rain below 200-300m.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive, lowest east Shrouding higher terrain widely, lowest on east and southern upslopes, cloud base 600 to 800m, typically higher toward Loch Tay and Rannoch, some breaks mostly on northwest aspects.	Extensive across higher areas Covering the mountains widely, above 600-800m in eastern areas, 800-1000m further west, occasional breaks furthest west.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20%	10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, some glimpses of sun mainly furthest west. Hazy, often whiteout over higher terrain in cloud and snow.	Widely cloudy, some brighter moments furthest west. Whiteout over the mountains in snow and cloud.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	-1 or -2C, coldest east, later lowering a degree or so from east. Wind chill feeling like -15 to -20C. 700 to 800m, lowering with time in east, later toward 400-500m.	-3 or -4C (to -6C on highest summits). Wind chill feeling like -17 to -20C. 300-400m, but locally more variable up to 600m toward Callander.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 5 February, 2026

East or southeasterly winds prevail, persistent gales later this week, severe chill factor over the mountains. Freezing levels will vary, lowering widely again below 600m during Thursday, though staying higher in Wales; then less cold widely into the weekend, rising just above freezing point in Scotland toward 1000m or briefly higher. Colder air then likely returns from east next week. Further snowfalls mostly over eastern hills in Scotland, occasionally hills in England & Wales, mixed with rain here. Indications of less precipitation and lower wind speeds for periods during next week. Highest cloud breaks generally west & northwest Scotland.

Forecast issued at 16:25 on Tuesday, 3 February, 2026
