


Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.

General Summary for Monday, 30 March, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 30 March, 2026

Gale-force west-northwesterlies, severe over higher Scottish mountains toward the north, squally gusts around showers of snow, also hail toward north early in the day. Light showers of rain or upland snow tending to fade with time, some breaks in cloud forming, best eastwards.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Gales over mountains. Snow showers, fading.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 30 March, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros)	West to northwesterly, 40 to 50mph, nearer 60mph with stronger gusts over highest summits in the morning.
Effect of wind on you?	Challenging conditions, difficult walking in exposure especially morning, gusts could knock you over. Significant wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Brief snow showers mostly morning Occasional brief showers of snow mostly central highlands in the morning. Becoming fewer well-scattered and lighter showers into afternoon, mostly rain below 600-700m; many places often dry.
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly high tops, clearer east Patchy cloud over higher terrain above 900-1000m, most frequent on central tops in morning, tending to rise. Breaks to tops in east and more widely with time. Will then lower from southwest into night.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	60% west, to 80% east
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sun, best toward east in morning. Visibility mostly good, briefly poor in snow.
How Cold? (at 900m)	-2C rising to +1 or 2C afternoon, then higher after dark. Wind chill feeling like -15 to -18C.
Freezing Level	700m from dawn, slight frost in sheltered glens; rising to 1000-1100m afternoon, then lifting above the summits into night.

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 31 March	Wednesday 1 April
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	West to southwesterly, 25 to 30mph, gusty 35mph in places around exposed high tops and ridges. Blustery over high terrain, affecting comfortable walking and balance on some exposed ridges. Considerable wind chill.	Southwesterly 30 to 45mph, stronger gusts for a time around high tops, may lessen and become variable later. Arduous walking conditions with buffeting gusts high tops, locally downslope to east, may lessen later. Significant wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy drizzle A little drizzle in the air at times, most common toward and west of the A9, amounting to little in total. Often dry east from Glenshee.	Rain developing, later snow Patchy rain or drizzly showers, developing with time into more persistent rain in central highlands, then more widely, risk turning heavier, later turning to snow on higher terrain.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive higher areas, breaks east Shrouding most hills in the morning above 700-900m, lowest toward west, some lower banks for a time. Tending to rise and break with time, best toward east. Banks likely linger above 800-1000m central highlands.	Fairly extensive higher areas Covering higher slopes particularly central highlands most or all day above 800-1000m, lowest in constant precipitation. Higher breaks east of the A9.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20% rising to 50% easternmost tops.	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun mostly eastern areas. Poor visibility on much higher terrain at least in morning, becoming good where cloud lifts and breaks.	Largely cloudy, local brighter moments east of the A9. Poor visibility in rain, very poor if snow develops on tops; locally better in east.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	4 or 5C. Feeling like -5C directly in the wind. Above freezing up to all summits.	4C, tending to drop to 1 or 2C, possibly 0C by later in the day. Feeling like -10C in exposure to wind. Above all summits likely for several hours at least, then dropping close to high tops, perhaps lowering further from dusk.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 31 March, 2026**

A drop of temperature is expected again across Scotland during Wednesday as a band of rain then upland snow drifts slowly southwards. Atlantic weather patterns and west-southwesterly winds likely continue into the start of the Easter period at least, a risk of further gales over the mountains. Temperature may remain variable, possibly often cold over the mountains with snow and hail showers at times to lower elevations at least in Scotland, sometimes more widely, mixed with some spells of rain - precipitation generally most frequent west and northwest. Some windows of drier and brighter conditions, but day-to-day detail is uncertain.

Forecast issued at 16:01 on Sunday, 29 March, 2026
