


Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.

General Summary for Tuesday, 31 March, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 31 March, 2026

A foggy, drizzly start for most, fog to lower slopes in western coastal areas. Fog lifts with time and drizzly rain eases, bursts of sun breaking out east, and perhaps more widely afternoon. Fog and drizzle lingers longest west Scotland and south Pennines. Blustery early, easing for most; a mild feel in England and Wales.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Blustery in exposure; drizzle and fog west, sun breaks east

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 31 March, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros)	West to southwesterly, 20 to 30mph, gusty 35mph in places around exposed high tops and ridges. Trending southwesterly with time.
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery over high terrain, affecting comfortable walking and balance on some exposed ridges with considerable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy drizzle, mostly central highlands Early in the day, some patchy rain drifting east, soon passing. A little drizzle in the air follows, most common towards central highlands and Loch Ericht, but amounting to little. Often dry Glenshee and east.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive higher areas, best breaks east Shrouding most hills in the morning above 700-900m, lowest west of the A9, some lower banks for a time. Tending to rise and break with time, best toward east, with some summit breaks likely though perhaps only brief. Fewer breaks to the west, but generally becoming more broken through the afternoon.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20%, rising to 60% easternmost tops.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Bursts of sun, mostly eastern areas, a few glimpses further west with time. Poor visibility on much higher terrain at least in morning, becoming good where cloud lifts and breaks.
How Cold? (at 900m)	4 or 5C, approaching 6C around Glenshee. Feeling like -5C directly in the wind.
Freezing Level	Above freezing up to all summits.

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Wednesday 1 April	Thursday 2 April
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Southwesterly 30 to 45mph, stronger gusts for a time around high tops, may lessen and become variable later. Arduous walking conditions with buffeting gusts high tops, locally downslope to east, may lessen later. Significant wind chill.	Variable 15mph or less in the morning, turning southerly and strengthening, 15-25mph. Mostly small, but beginning to feel blustery in exposure as the afternoon goes.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain developing, snow to tops later Patchy rain or scattered drizzly showers, developing into more persistent rain central highlands afternoon, spreading widely and turning heavier, later turning to snow on higher terrain.	Likely dry Small chance of some snow flurries affecting hills east of Glenshee, perhaps Angus as well (falling as rain below 500-700m).
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive Covering higher slopes particularly central highlands most or all day above 800-1000m, lowest in constant precipitation, to 600-700m. Higher breaks east of the A9.	Mostly high terrain, some breaks Cloud mostly confined above 900-1000m, some lower banks early in the day. For a time, some breaks off summits probable, best east; the cloud layer spreading more widely across high terrain around Callander/Loch Tay with time.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20%	50% east, lowering to 30% west
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, local brighter moments east of the A9. Visibility increasingly poor as rain sets in, very poor where in snow.	Bursts of sunshine, the sun most consistent on lower slopes. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	4C, tending to drop to 1 or 2C, possibly 0C by later in the day. Feeling like -10C in exposure to wind. Above all summits through morning, then dropping close to high tops, perhaps lowering further from dusk.	-3C lifting to -1C or 0C. Terrain widely frozen at dawn. Rising, approaching 800-900m.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 1 April, 2026**

A drop of temperature is expected across Scotland during Wednesday as a band of rain drifts slowly southwards, turning to heavy upland snow. Atlantic weather patterns and west-southwesterly winds follow behind into the start of the Easter period at least, but day-to-day detail is uncertain. Temperature and wind will be variable, periods of gales and possibly often cold over the mountains with snow and hail showers at times to lower elevations at least in Scotland, sometimes more widely, mixed with some spells of rain - precipitation generally most frequent west and northwest, though bands of heavy rain will sweep east at times. Some windows of drier and brighter conditions, as well as milder days in England and Wales, occasionally milder Scotland too.
