

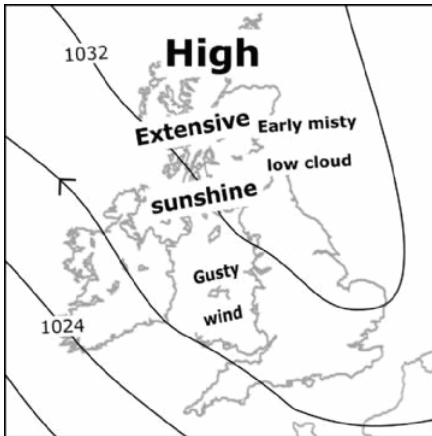
Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Thursday, 23 April, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 23 April, 2026

Gusty easterly winds for England, Wales and southern Scotland, but warmer and less windy overall than recent days. Light winds for much of the Highlands. Some early low-level mist, mostly toward eastern Pennines, but the mountains clear with bright sunshine widely; high UV levels, beware sunburn.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Mostly light wind. Sunshine, warming up.

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 23 April, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southeasterly 10 to 15mph, local gusty 20mph some mountains in Callander area.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No precipitation expected
Cloud on the hills?	Little or none Patchy fog in glens, possible low cloud around some southern hill slopes for a time, fragments may drift briefly upslope, but all dispersing.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	Above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive sunshine. Visibility excellent.
How Cold? (at 900m)	5C rising to 9C, locally warmer during afternoon.
Freezing Level	Frost in glens and some sheltered higher areas at dawn. Otherwise above freezing to the summits.

How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Variable 10mph or less. Negligible.	Variable mostly 10mph or less. May become north-northwesterly 20mph mainly easternmost areas. Mostly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain expected	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	Some early low mist, otherwise clear Patchy mist in the glens at dawn, mostly toward the central and eastern lowlands, briefly begins lifting upslope after sunrise but soon dissipates for cloud-free hills. Practically certain	None expected Some low-level mist mainly eastern glens in the morning, possibly an early layer of fog covering low terrain over the eastern lowlands, which will thin back to the coast. Chance of patchy cloud over eastern tops. 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive sunshine. Very good visibility, slight low-level haze toward central belt.	Extensive sunshine. Visibility very good, slight low-level haze near central belt.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	8C rising to 11 or 12C. (Glens start much cooler, then approach 20C afternoon). Above the summits. At dawn, slight frost in some glens and possibly sheltered elevated hollows.	8 to 10C, possibly dropping cooler in more eastern areas afternoon. Above the summits. Patchy frost at dawn inland glens and sheltered higher areas.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 24 April, 2026

A generally dry spell of weather continues into the weekend and next week, with mostly light winds and pleasantly warm temperatures, reaching 10C+ on many tops. Valleys and some sheltered higher areas will see some frosty dawns but by the afternoons many valleys will warm up toward 20C. Briefly cooler air drifts back into northeastern areas later Saturday. Strong April sunshine widely across the mountains, beware risk of sunburn. Misty starts in some valleys.

Forecast issued at 16:00 on Wednesday, 22 April, 2026
