

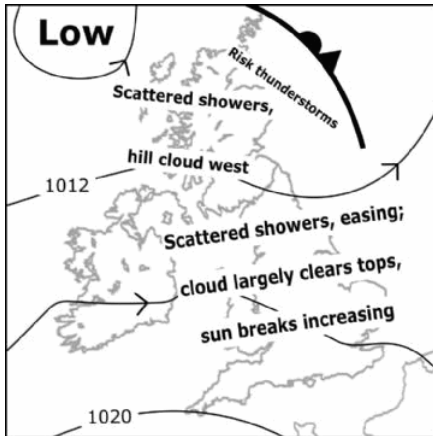
Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Sunday, 31 May, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 31 May, 2026

Showers in Scotland, most frequent west where hill cloud will linger; clearer east, cloud caps around showers. Early showers and hill cloud England and Wales, cloud lifts to just passing caps Scafell and Yr Wyddfa, sun bursts breaking out and showers largely fade. Moderate breeze, occasional stronger gusts high tops.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Scattered showers, dry windows; cloud mostly clears hills

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 31 May, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros)	West-southwesterly 15-25mph, trending westerly with time. Strongest wind most often south of Loch Rannoch.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, ease of walking sometimes affected on exposed tops.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers, dry windows from midday Morning showers, and perhaps a few hours of heavier, more persistent rain early. Breaking into scattered showers, extended dry windows; some risk of heavy, thundery rain in the far east/Angus hills afternoon.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting above the summits, caps graze central highland tops Fairly extensive from middle slopes up from before dawn, starting to break just as the sun rises. Bases lift towards 900m, and often above east of A9 where cloud is well-broken. Munros towards central highlands seeing passing cloud caps, but often clear.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	Rising to 80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Early cloud breaks in to a patchwork of cloud and sunshine, extended sun spells to the east. Excellent visibility away from showers.
How Cold? (at 900m)	7C rising to 9C, locally 10C around Lochnagar and Angus hills.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Monday 1 June	Tuesday 2 June
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Westerly before dawn, soon shifting southerly 10-15mph, strengthening to 15-20mph afternoon. Fairly small.	West-southwesterly 10 to 20mph, but may be variable low speeds at times. Mostly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy rain, more frequent afternoon Rain from the southwest comes and goes through the day, increasingly frequent afternoon with some heavy falls, only local drier spots by later in the day.	Showers, becoming heavy, thundery Scattered showers in morning developing more widely into afternoon, some heavier bursts, later in day more concentrated toward the east, risk of isolated thunder.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	Mostly clear morning, deteriorating afternoon Variable banks above 700m at dawn, many hills clear, and this cloud clearing for several hours around midday. Cloud will lower through afternoon, fairly extensively covering hills above 700m by evening, lower towards east lowlands. 80% lowering to 20%	Varied over tops, some breaks Patchy cloud banks over hills in morning, becoming confined to upper slopes with breaks to tops. Around showers, cloud lowering over hills, varied ragged patches. 50%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of morning sun, soon turning mostly cloudy. Excellent visibility away from rain, deteriorating later.	Glimpses of sun, though possibly often cloudy. Visibility very good, reduced in showers.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	6C rising to 9C. Above the summits.	8C up to 10C afternoon. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 1 June, 2026

An unsettled week ahead with low pressure facilitating periods of rain, showers, and a strengthening wind, as well as cooler temperatures. Rain spreads across most areas from the southwest on Monday, followed by showers on Tuesday, these showers perhaps turning into thunderstorms in central and east areas. The only settled window this week overnight into Wednesday, then more rain soon arrives from the west through Wednesday morning, spreading widely and with it gales likely over most hills as well except the far north of Scotland. Thursday and Friday remain showery and windy, nearly persistent rain and extensive low cloud northwest England and west Scotland, a few breaks in the east but showers always most widespread afternoon and even smaller hills seeing cloud over summits for periods.
