

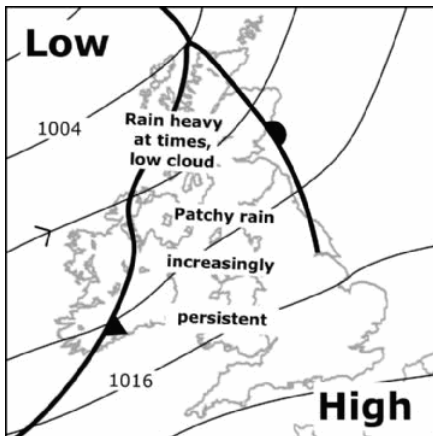
Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Sunday, 7 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 7 June, 2026

Scotland: Strong and gusty south-westerly winds will drive hill fog and frequent rainfall across western mountains, setting in during afternoon. Rainfall patchier across eastern hills with higher bases. England and Wales: Windy with patchy light rain onto western hills, becoming more widely damp or wet through the day.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Blustery with patchy rain, becoming more frequent in the afternoon. Chilly.

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 7 June, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southwesterly 30-35mph, sometimes gusting 40mph, and risk stronger sustained speeds for several afternoon hours.
Effect of wind on you?	Strenuous walking in exposure all day with notable wind chill, risk arduous periods with persistent balance challenges.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy rain, setting in for a time Patches of rain drifting from the southwest early, mostly light in nature. Patches increasingly frequent from later morning, and may become frequent for several afternoon hours with local heavy falls. May breaks later.
Cloud on the hills?	Coming and going over high terrain Banks of cloud at varied heights in the morning, mostly from 600m upward, soon beginning to lift with lowest banks dissipating. By afternoon, mostly just banks over tops, some breaks, but also may deteriorate.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	30% lifting to 60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchy sun through high cloud, becoming increasingly weakened. Variable visibility, very good for periods out of cloud.
How Cold? (at 900m)	7 to 9C, highest east of Glenshee. Feeling below freezing in strongest wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Monday 8 June	Tuesday 9 June
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Southwesterly 20 to 30mph. Feeling blustery, starting to affect comfortable walking and a noticeable chill on exposed high terrain.	Southwesterly 10 to 15mph, but tending to strengthen towards and into the afternoon to 20 to 25mph, perhaps 30mph tops. May impede ease of walking over some tops in afternoon, with a considerable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showery rain increasingly Broadly showery, heavier bursts of rain most widely during the afternoon, risk isolated thunder, later particularly more eastern areas.	Showers developing widely Isolated showers west at first, otherwise dry. However, showers developing to become widespread PM. Risk thunder. Some hail. Wet snow at times tops.
Cloud on the hills?	Often capping high tops Varying cloud banks over upper slopes, mostly above 900m, some higher breaks best in east of A9, but ragged patches lower in showers.	Occasional over upper slopes Hills may be clear at times. However in showery rain, patches or banks forming; mainly above 800-1000m, but varying in extent in and out of showers.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	40%	70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Brief bursts of sun. Visibility good away from showers and below cloud.	Patches of sun, most frequent eastern hills. Visibility very good, but sometimes poor in showers.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	4 or 5C. Feeling like -5C directly in the wind. Above the summits.	3 to 5C, highest by mid afternoon. Close to very highest tops

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 8 June, 2026**

The unsettled period of weather will persist over the coming week with low pressure area centres tracking just to the northwest of Scotland, allowing south-westerly winds to prevail. Rainfall often showery in nature, but coming in frequently to western mountains with the greatest falls for western Scotland. Chilly and windy at times; freezing level touching highest tops Scotland on Tuesday and Wednesday, when showers will fall as snow over the tops. Temperatures trending milder again next weekend, pressure may begin to rise in the south to give drier weather more widely.
