

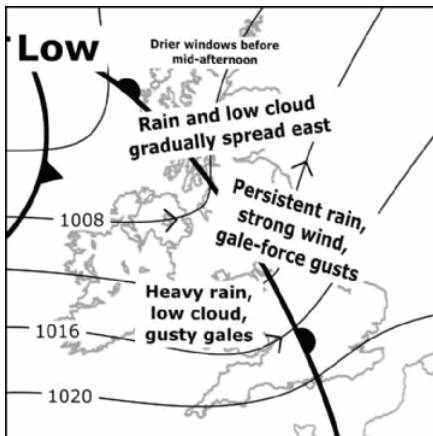
Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Thursday, 11 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 11 June, 2026

Persistent rain onto western hills from dawn, soon spreading widely. Murky with heavy falls, extended heavy falls west Wales. Very windy England and Wales, gale-force gusts, strongest Wales. Rain and strong wind slower to reach north and east Scotland though blanket low cloud fills in.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Persistent rain sets in from west; becoming very windy later

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 11 June, 2026

<p>How windy? (On the Munros)</p> <p>Effect of wind on you?</p>	<p>Southwesterly 15-25mph; some variability, but also gusty over high tops, reaching 30mph or stronger for periods, shifting more southerly for a few midday hours. Shifting westerly into evening, strengthening to sustained 30-40mph.</p> <p>Fairly small in places, but some more blustery and gusty areas around higher mountains, at times affecting stability. Marked wind chill. Probably starting to deteriorate later in the day.</p>
<p>How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)</p>	<p>Rain most persistent west</p> <p>Rain soon spreading in from the southwest, lasting much of the day central highlands, where some steadier heavier falls at times, somewhat patchier in east, but periods of rain and drizzle widely, particularly afternoon into evening.</p>
<p>Cloud on the hills?</p> <p>Chance of cloud free Munros?</p>	<p>Extensive</p> <p>Varied cloud banks early in day, perhaps very briefly clear east of A9, but soon low cloud filling in widely, to lower elevations southern slopes, shrouding most hills above 600m with time.</p> <p>10%</p>
<p>Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)</p>	<p>Overcast and dull, local brighter start in east, but cloudy. Visibility good if dry in east, otherwise generally poor in rain.</p>
<p>How Cold? (at 900m)</p> <p>Freezing Level</p>	<p>3 or 4C at dawn rising to 6 or 7C afternoon, and perhaps to 8C for a few hours later in the day. Feeling increasingly cool in direct wind, later to -3 to -5C.</p> <p>Above the summits.</p>

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Friday 12 June	Saturday 13 June
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	West or southwesterly, 25 to 40mph. Trending towards higher speeds late in the day. Strenuous walking where exposed over high terrain, some buffeting gusts starting to affect balance. Marked wind chill.	Westerly 40-50mph, shifting northwesterly later. Speeds will vary, may ease somewhat central highlands later. Arduous or difficult walking over the high tops with significant wind chill. Maintaining stability requires sustained effort.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Drizzly rain mostly west Drizzly showers merging into more frequent light rain at times central highlands. Patchier eastwards, more often dry near and east of Glenshee; some risk showers spreading further east later afternoon.	Patchy rain, more afternoon Patchy rain drifting from the northwest for much of the day, some more persistent falls possible near Loch Ericht. A risk of setting in more widely for several afternoon hours, always driest towards Ochil hills.
Cloud on the hills?	Persistent west, higher east Shrouding central highlands much of the day, lowest cloud bases in Callander area, to 600m or sometimes lower. Mostly above 800m toward the A9, with higher and more broken cloud further eastwards.	Mostly just tops, more extensive later Banks over the high tops likely from dawn, best chance of breaks east of the A9; more sheet-like cloud towards central highlands with bases to 800m. May fill in more extensively to at least 800m later afternoon.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20% west, to 60% east.	50%, probably deteriorating later afternoon
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, glimpses of sun mainly eastern areas. Visibility good below cloud in east, reduced at times in rain, more often in west.	Bursts of sunshine, particularly lower slopes eastern areas, later more cloudy. Very good visibility out of cloud and rain.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	6C rising to 8C afternoon. Feeling like -3 to -5C where exposed to wind on the Munros. Above the summits.	5 or 6C, rising to 7C, or locally 8C towards Callander/Ochils. Feeling as cold as -5C in direct wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 12 June, 2026

Damp westerly breezes on Friday will cloak most mountains in cloud and some drizzle, better conditions eastwards. Cool and strong westerlies persist in Scotland on Saturday, then warmer with lighter winds by Sunday. Some patchy rain remaining in west and northwest Scotland over the weekend. Pressure tends to rise from the south this weekend, bringing warmer air and drier conditions to England & Wales, although west coast mountains may hold onto cloud. Into next week, a mixed southwesterly pattern remains, windy at times with periods of rain, drizzle and low cloud most persistent in the west. Warmest in England and Wales, but cooler westerly air likely returns at times mid-late week. Higher pressure then shows more signs of expanding over the country by late next week bringing improving conditions.
