

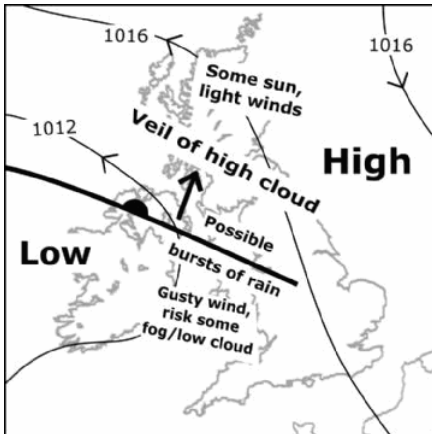
Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Monday, 15 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 15 June, 2026

A largely dry day for the Highlands, light winds inland and north, some sun, but a layer of cloud increasingly covers the sky from the south, later some rain moving into coastal areas. A little rain for northern England and Wales, locally risk of a heavier burst of rain forming. Gusty southerly winds particularly Wales.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Light wind. Generally dry until late, variable cloud largely clears.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 15 June, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros)	Variable 10mph or less, orienting east-southeasterly and rising to 10-15mph evening, some stronger gusts later central highlands.
Effect of wind on you?	Small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Dry most of daylight, rain into night Late in the day, some patchy rain approaches from the southwest, but most Munros stay dry until nighttime, then rain extends more widely northeast, odd heavier bursts.
Cloud on the hills?	Varied cloud lifting into afternoon Banks of cloud at various heights in the morning, more extensive for a time, including in glens and corries. Cloud lifts, dissipating through morning for clearing Munros into afternoon. Up to dusk, some lowering cloud from south.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	50% rising to 80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mixed cloud early in day, becoming sunnier for a time, high cloud then thickening through afternoon. Very good visibility after misty start around some slopes.
How Cold? (at 900m)	4 or 5C at dawn, rising to 9 or 10C.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 16 June	Wednesday 17 June
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Southerly 15-20mph, trending higher with time, gusts to 25-30mph over high summits afternoon. Fairly small for a time, but increasingly blustery, ease of walking affected in exposure and feeling chilly.	Southwesterly 20 to 30mph, in places stronger gusts around highest summits. Fairly small in places, but some blustery slopes, may make walking more strenuous on exposed high terrain.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy rain Patchy rain drifts from the south and southwest much of the day. Dry windows probably for several midday hours, but always a risk of light patches drifting into eastern hills. Later, more frequent falls return from southwest.	Intermittent rain Patchy rain, more frequent rain central highlands for periods, some showery rain mixed in passing eastwards. Drier more often southeast from Glenshee.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive All hills shrouded above 600-700m all day, lower bases in the morning. Some brief higher breaks north of Loch Rannoch to Glenshee afternoon, but then returning widely extensively into evening.	Most persistent west, may improve Fairly extensive over hills in rain. The most persistent cloud near Callander, to 600m around rain. Often capping most hills west of A9 to 800-900m, higher eastward. Rising afternoon, some breaks forming.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	10%	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast, often dull. Poor visibility on high terrain due to fog, better under cloud.	Fairly cloudy, glimpses of sun, mainly eastern areas. Visibility very good, but reduced at times around rain.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	6C rising to 9C. Feeling like +1 to 3C in direct wind. Above the summits.	8C rising to 11C out of cloud in afternoon. Feeling near to freezing directly in wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 16 June, 2026**

A variable southwesterly will dominate through mid to late this week - windy at times with periods of rain, drizzle and low cloud most persistent in the west. Pressure generally trending higher from the south by the weekend, though into Saturday at least a damp westerly likely prevails into western Scotland. Warmest in England and Wales, but cooler in Scotland as low pressure to the northwest recycles air from the north Atlantic back onto the Munros. A window of drier and warmer weather is favoured into early the following week (22nd June), though a mixed Atlantic pattern may linger near to northwest Scotland in the longer range.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Sunday, 14 June, 2026
