

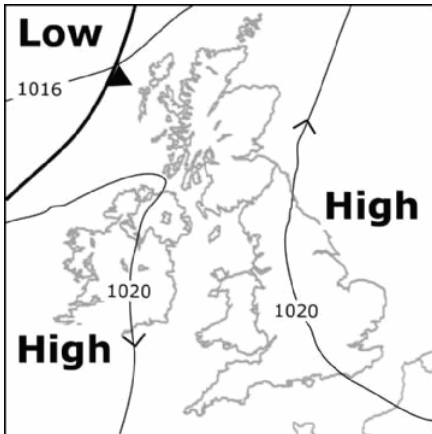
# Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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## General Summary for Tuesday, 23 June, 2026



**British Mountain Summary:**  
**Based on forecast chart for noon 23 June, 2026**

Becoming very warm and humid, particularly Wales where exceptionally so. Chillier north and west of Scotland, especially near the coast where it will become drizzly and misty. Elsewhere, be aware of dehydration and sunburn..

### Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Becoming very warm indeed. Sunshine and very clear air.

## Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 23 June, 2026

<b>How windy? (On the Munros)</b>	Southwesterly, 20 to 25mph; least wind near central belt.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	Fairly small.
<b>How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)</b>	Rain very unlikely
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Little if any</b> Fragments may temporarily shroud higher slopes mid morning - before lifting above the summits.
<b>Chance of cloud free Munros?</b>	<b>Almost certain</b>
<b>Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)</b>	Extensive sunshine; just patchy cloud developing. Excellent visibility although hazy toward central belt.
<b>How Cold? (at 900m)</b>	1C rising to an unusually warm 20C by mid afternoon.
<b>Freezing Level</b>	Above the summits.

## Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Wednesday 24 June	Thursday 25 June
<b>How windy? (On the Munros)</b> <b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	Southwesterly, mostly 10mph or less, but increasing to 20mph above about 900m; possibly 25mph highest tops. <b>Small</b>	South to southeasterly between 10 and 20mph; perhaps particularly gusty at times. <b>Generally small, although there may be sudden buffeting at times both on higher areas and some lower slopes.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Rain not expected</b>	<b>Risk thunderstorms</b> Risk scattered thunderstorms giving locally torrential rain.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Little if any</b>  Risk fog some lower slopes in Angus, mainly those near the coast. Higher slopes very likely to be above the cloud.	<b>Mountains substantially cloud free; patches forming near rain</b>  Mountains extensively cloud free. In thunderstorms, fog may be extensive some hills, in places from lower slopes up.
<b>Chance of cloud free Munros?</b>	<b>Almost certain</b>	<b>90%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive sunshine. Excellent visibility.	Glimpses of sun through high level cloud - perhaps increasingly sunny from the south afternoon and evening. Hazy, particularly near central belt.
<b>How Cold? (at 900m)</b>  <b>Freezing Level</b>	14C rising to a very warm 18 to 20C.  Above the summits.	A very warm 17 to 20C. Unusually humid.  Above the summits.

## Planning Outlook

### All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 24 June, 2026

Exceptionally warm and humid most mountain areas until later Friday. The range in temperature in the detailed forecasts for Wednesday and Thursday reflect uncertainty in just how far north the extreme heat will penetrate - with more recent forecasts suggesting the (even) more extreme temperatures.

Scattered thunderstorms on Thursday and Friday, whilst over the weekend, progressively less warm as fronts begin to come in off the Atlantic, bringing bands of rain and low cloud, particularly affecting western mountains.
