

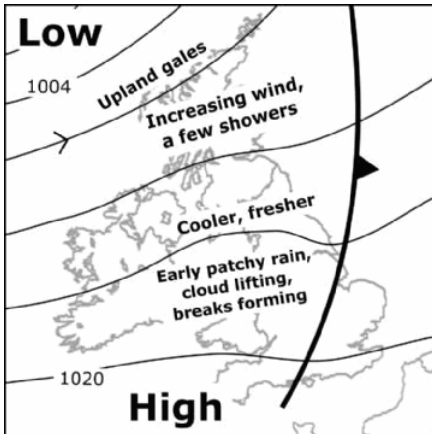
Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.

General Summary for Sunday, 28 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 28 June, 2026

Strengthening southwesterly winds, reaching gale force over western Scottish mountains, soonest near Skye. Much fresher everywhere, rather chilly on tops in exposure to wind. Some early rain, improving as cloud lifts and breaks, but scattered showers move east across the Highlands into the afternoon.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Brisk winds. Patchy rain, showers; cloud lifts, breaks to tops.

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 28 June, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southwesterly 20-30mph, but 40mph around and before dawn higher eastern tops. Trending towards higher speeds again later, gusting 35-40mph over high tops late in the day.
Effect of wind on you?	Ease of walking impacted, increasingly strenuous through afternoon and feeling cool.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Morning rain, local showers afternoon Several bands of rain drift west-to-east from before dawn into morning, brief heavy falls and dry windows. By middle of day, just patchy rain, greatest chance central highlands. Later afternoon a cluster of showers spreading from west, mostly into evening in east.
Cloud on the hills?	Summits increasingly clearing Variable bases from 700-900m early morning, or lower during heavier rain at first, but lifting. Into afternoon, rising with high breaks forming likely above the summits. Patches return in showers over western tops.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	30% rising to 80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A few glimpses of morning sunshine, then a patchwork of cloud and sun by middle of day. Visibility becomes excellent.
How Cold? (at 900m)	8 to 10C, mildest east Munros in the morning, slight cooling trend afternoon. Feeling near freezing in strongest wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Monday 29 June	Tuesday 30 June
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	West-southwesterly 30-35mph at dawn, gusty over the tops. Easing to finish near 15-25mph. Strenuous walking early with considerable buffeting and wind chill in exposure; easing to fairly small effects by evening.	Southerly 15 to 20mph, perhaps 25mph for a time, but may drop lighter and variable. Fairly small, possibly feeling more blustery for a few hours on higher terrain.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Scattered patchy rain Patchy rain drifting from the west at dawn soon becoming confined towards the central highlands, may largely ease except for spots around Callander. East of A9 substantially dry.	Rain and showers A risk of frequent or more persistent rain mainly west in morning, then becoming areas of slow-moving showers into the afternoon, some places drier, but locally heavy bursts, risk of isolated thunder.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive central highlands, improving Most hills shrouded above 700-800m at dawn, to locally 500m or lower central highlands. Soon to lift and begin breaking east of A9, many summits seeing breaks afternoon. Slower to improve west where banks often come and go above 800m.	Fairly extensive Shrouding most high terrain all day, varying bases around rain, some ragged patches to lower slopes. Local breaks may form higher up, mainly east of the A9.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	30% rising to 70%	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A patchwork of cloud and sun, most extensive sun well-east. Very good visibility.	Largely cloudy, brief sun mainly east. Visibility occasionally very good if dry, but reduced in rain, poor for periods.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	6 or 7C, rising to 10C. Feeling below freezing in strongest wind. Above the summits.	8C rising to 10C afternoon. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 29 June, 2026**

A westerly Atlantic pattern dominates the new week: high pressure south and low pressure north will bring alternating periods of rain punctuated by bright sunshine. Wind generally on the strong side with mild to sometimes warm temperatures, though cooler and windier spells at times produce significant wind chill on Scottish tops. Western hill groups from Lakeland northward will see the most cloud and patchy rain, while east and southern areas likely drier and sunnier. This pattern is likely to continue into next weekend.

Forecast issued at 16:00 on Saturday, 27 June, 2026
