

Southeastern Highlands

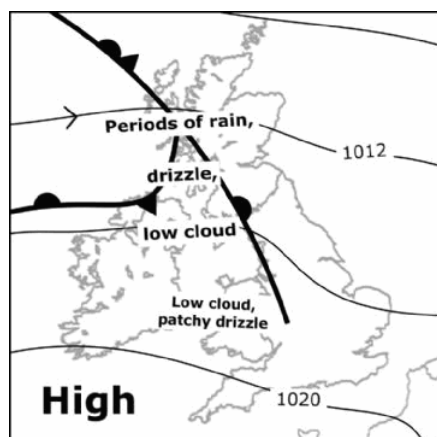

General Summary for Monday, 27 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 27 July, 2026

Fresh to strong west to southwesterly winds, rather cool on Scottish tops. Rain and drizzle frequent in western Scotland, patchier eastwards. Some drizzly rain for Lakes and north Wales. Low cloud affecting most western hills, higher bases eastwards.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Blustery, patchy rain, drizzle and low cloud mostly west

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 27 July, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	West-southwesterly 25 to 30mph, stronger gusts over higher Munros nearer 40mph, sustained speeds tending to rise over more southern tops afternoon-evening, often 35-40mph, stronger gusts. Ease of walking impacted in exposure, in places more strenuous over tops, likely increasingly challenging especially Munros near central belt. Feeling rather cool on tops.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy rain and drizzle, wettest toward west of the A9 Drizzly over the summits towards central highlands in the morning, some patchy rain drifting from the west, becoming more constant rain late morning into early afternoon, patchier rain eastwards. Staying drizzly later western areas.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	Increasingly extensive from west Patchy banks at various heights early, some breaks toward the east for a few hours. Trending towards extensive low cloud over central highlands summits, filling in over most tops through middle of day, fairly extensive to 700m in west. 60% lowering to 20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A patchwork of cloud and sun, very good visibility where dry, but increasingly cloudier towards central highlands, poorer visibility in rain.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	7C rising to 11 or 12C afternoon, little change into night. Feeling like 0 to -3C in strongest wind on the Munros. Above the summits.

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 28 July	Wednesday 29 July
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Southwesterly 40 to 55mph, gusts 70mph around higher mountains. Difficult walking conditions on exposed higher terrain, gusts could knock you over. Considerable wind chill.	Southwesterly 25 to 35mph, strongest in the morning, nearer 40mph around/after dawn. Lessening a little later in day. Blustery over the hills, considerable buffeting gradually lessening, but will affect comfortable walking much of day.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Frequent or persistent rain Periods of persistent rain widely, mixed with drizzle, generally wettest for central highlands up to the A9. Easing off to be drier at times, for longest in eastern areas.	Patchy rain and showers Occasional rain, a mix of drizzle and some showery bursts, a chance of becoming more frequent, locally heavy.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	Extensive, lowest west Blanket cloud shrouding the mountains much of the day above 500-700m Callander area, to 700-800m near A9, some higher breaks further east. 20%	Fairly extensive Likely to cover most higher terrain much of the day above 700-900m, some lower banks on southern slopes especially around rain. Some breaks mainly east. 20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, poor visibility in rain, some improvements to be good below cloud when dry, brief moments of sun in east.	Largely cloudy. Visibility poor around rain, improving below cloud if dry.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	11C, little variation all day, locally up to 13C eastern areas, quite humid. Feeling below freezing directly in wind. Above the summits.	11C, may rise to 14C eastern areas. Feeling near to freezing in the wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 28 July, 2026**

Southwesterly winds will bring rain to most places early this week, some more prolonged heavier falls for western Scotland into Tuesday, accompanied by gales over high terrain, severe on Scottish tops, but rather humid for all, warm for England and Wales. Cooler air toward northwest Scotland moves across all of Scotland by Wednesday. Showery rain through mid-late week, some heavy and possibly thundery bursts, mainly Scotland. Likely drier for Wales and southern Pennines. Remaining very uncertain detail toward next weekend and early the following week, but indications favour a broad zone of low pressure bringing areas of rain and heavy showers through early August.
