

Southeastern Highlands

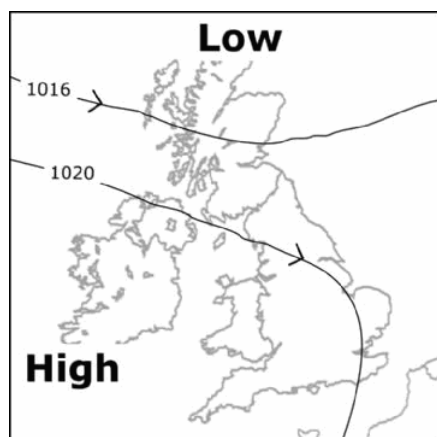
The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Erich, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Saturday, 1 August, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 1 August, 2026

England and Wales extensively dry with periods of sun and particularly Wales fairly light wind. Increasingly showery northwards across Scotland, although mostly confined to afternoon eastern mountains. Fairly chilly, particularly morning.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Chilly morning; scattered showers, mainly afternoon.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 1 August, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros)	Westerly 20-25mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers developing Showers, some briefly heavy, from late morning or midday onwards. Mostly dying out again from early evening.
Cloud on the hills?	Summits increasingly clearing At dawn, varied cloud above 600m, mostly west of A9. Cloud base lifts through morning, many summits clearing by midday, but cloud may continue to come and go above about 1200m or 1050m central highlands..
Chance of cloud free Munros?	80% by midday
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly sunny morning, sunshine gradually more patchy. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	6C rising to 12C. Will feel near freezing point directly in wind in morning.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Sunday 2 August	Monday 3 August
How windy? (On the Munros)	Westerly 20, perhaps 25mph after dawn. Will drop toward 10mph, probably by early or mid afternoon.	Easterly 15 to 25mph; very gusty in places.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small before becoming mostly negligible.	Mostly fairly small, but expect sudden gusts to develop (sometimes on lower slopes) making balance tricky.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain very unlikely Possibly the odd brief shower, but very likely dry.	Deteriorating: rain increasingly likely Low confidence - timing of changes very uncertain: As cloud thickens from south, rain will probably spread northwards, and become widespread and constant.
Cloud on the hills?	More or less all clearing Patches over a few hours on some higher slopes, but by late morning, very little anywhere.	Increasingly extensive in rain Most, possibly all hills cloud free morning, possibly for most of day. In rain, fog will gradually shroud higher slopes extensively, and in persistent rain extend to some or many lower slopes.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	50% gradually rising to 90%	80% dropping to 20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Periods of sunshine, although later the sun hazy. Excellent visibility.	Little or no sunshine. Excellent visibility, but dropping markedly in rain.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	6C rising to 14C. Feeling close to or below freezing point directly in wind in morning. Above the summits.	9C Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 2 August, 2026

Still a few showers W & NW Highlands on Sunday, and threat of some rain by dusk western mountains. The rain will be ahead of a very complicated weather pattern early next week; areas of rain will drift slowly across central and mainly northern Britain, but the distribution of rain (and associated low cloud) remains very uncertain.

Despite some recent rain (mainly in Scotland), away from the W & NW Highlands terrain remains exceptionally dry: 'tinder dry'.
