

Southeastern Highlands

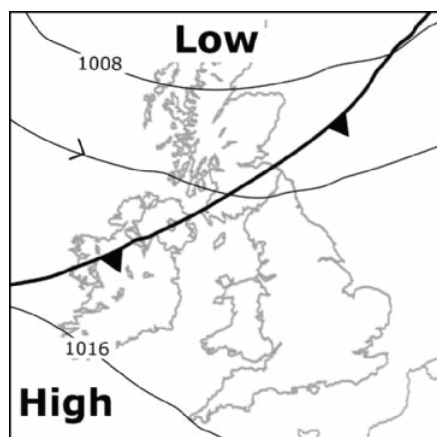
The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Erich, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Sunday, 9 August, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 9 August, 2026

A cold front, bringing rain and low cloud will progress only slowly southeast into central Britain. To the north, drizzly showers and low cloud will affect western mountains (mainly NW Highlands) whilst to the south mostly sunny and very warm.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 9 August, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Westerly 40mph post dawn. Dropping from north during morning, perhaps midday near central belt to 20 to 30mph, strongest higher summits north Perthshire. Arduous walking mainly morning with notable wind chill, particularly higher areas north Perthshire.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain clearing from north later morning Rain on and off from dawn, ceasing. from north mid morning to early afternoon (last to clear near central belt).
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	Cloud base rising but remaining extensive on higher tops, particularly west of A9 Cloud base rising through morning or perhaps into the afternoon to typically 850 to 1000m although will probably clear all summits near and east of Glenshee. Rising to 60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A cloudy start will gradually give way to a patchwork of or extensive sun. Excellent visibility developing after being poor in rain morning.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	9C. Feeling near freezing in direct wind at first. Above the summits.

How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Northwesterly 15-25mph morning, progressively dropping to very low speeds later in day. Fairly small	Southerly 15mph. Mostly negligible
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Chance of a shower Chance isolated brief showers; not heavy.	Rain not expected
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	All clearing Patches some higher slopes will clear by about mid morning. 90%	Little if any In morning there may be cloud above about 500m perhaps widely, the highest risk east of the A9 - the base rising before eventually dispersing. 70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Periods of sun - perhaps through areas of high level cloud. Excellent or increasingly superb visibility.	Extensive perhaps unbroken sunshine although sometimes through high thin cloud and possibly cloudy some areas morning. Superb visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	6C, rising toward 13C. Above the summits.	7C rising to 14C Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 10 August, 2026

Extensively fine and warm until Wednesday.

The almost completely dry and warm weather will then persist across England and Wales - although sometimes a little rain and low cloud toward Cumbria. Underfoot conditions will remain exceptionally dry.

Scotland, especially the W& NW Highlands, will have intermittent rain and low cloud - although probably still one or two fairly brief dry periods.
