

Southeastern Highlands

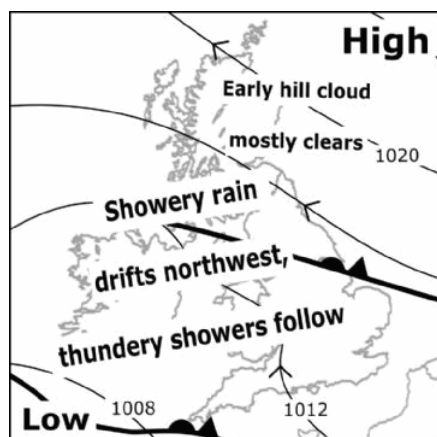
The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Wednesday, 26 August, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 26 August, 2026

East Scotland, the Pennines, and Wales start cloudy, this lifting, dissipating over much of Scotland. Early showery rain and cloud in Wales migrates to England and southwest Scotland, thundery showers following over Wales and England; driest/clearest northwest Scotland. Warm, humid, and breezy.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Early cloud, some drizzle, mostly clearing

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 26 August, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros)	East-southeasterly 20 to 30mph, gusty in places, typically strongest west-central highlands.
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery, some notable gusty areas may suddenly affect balance around high tops and locally downslope to the west.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Mostly little rain Patchy drizzle some eastern slopes where in cloud. Odd spots from high cloud elsewhere, a few bursts of rain forming later from Loch Tay southward; chance of longer falls late in the day/into nighttime.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive to start, many hills clearing Shrouding many hills above 600 to 800m, some lower banks for periods on southern slopes. A rising trend, much cloud may dissipate for several hours, particularly north of Loch Tay. Banks may just graze the high tops near Callander, and later return more widely from the south.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20%, rising to 70% north of Loch Tay
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sun through high cloud, more cloudy in the morning and high cloud tending to thicken from the south later in the day. Visibility fairly good but a haze will build from the east.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9C rising to 13C afternoon. Feeling like 2 to 5C in the wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 27 August, 2026

Heavy, thundery rain likely affects England, Wales & southern Scotland on Thursday and Friday, potentially prolonged heavy falls bringing a risk of local flooding. A westerly wind will establish into the weekend, drawing cloud and drizzle onto western high terrain, several frontal systems sweeping more broadly across the country. The strongest wind and heavy rain may pass mostly across England and Wales, with the lightest rain in west Scotland. Best chance of cloud base rising towards higher terrain in western areas, perhaps briefly to higher summits, but the hills more often shrouded, patches to low slopes around heaviest rain. A west-southwesterly weather track prevails next week: cloud and drizzle on western hill groups (particularly west Scotland), breezy, areas of rain regularly spreading more widely.
