

Southeastern Highlands

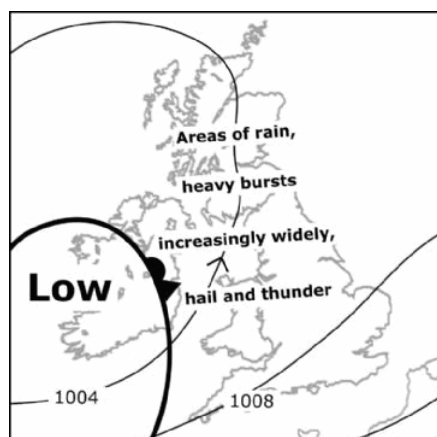

General Summary for Sunday, 30 August, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 30 August, 2026

Areas of rain and low cloud around many mountains. Some drier periods in the morning, but into afternoon increasingly widespread heavy downpours and thunderstorms develop. Fairly light winds for much of the Highlands, becoming breezier England, stronger winds on Welsh mountains.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Rain and increasingly thundery bursts, low cloud.

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 30 August, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros)	South to southeasterly, 5 to 15mph, speed tending to rise during day, at times 20mph into afternoon.
Effect of wind on you?	Small, sudden gusts in showers.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Frequent rain, heavy at times; risk of lightning Areas of steady rain in the morning, some heavier falls possible, local drier windows for a time. Into afternoon, heavy bursts of rain develop fairly widely, but particularly central highlands with risk of hail and thunder.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive, rare breaks Shrouding the hills most of the day, with varied banks from lower elevations upward in the morning. Some rise of cloud with breaks possible for a time, but rare to higher slopes. In rain lowering again with ragged low patches.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Generally cloudy, murky in rain, local improvements in visibility where dry.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9 or 10C, slight rise during day.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Monday 31 August	Tuesday 1 September
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Westerly 10-20mph early in day, strongest Callander area, strengthening from west to 30mph, some stronger gusts develop. Fairly small at first, but becoming blustery affecting ease of walking in exposure; marked wind chill developing.	Westerly 25 to 40mph, speeds may vary, risk 50mph with stronger gusts for a few hours mainly morning. Strenuous walking conditions, buffeting affecting balance on exposed ridges. Risk difficult for a time. Considerable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers moving east Patchy areas of rain in the morning, some drier windows. Showers develop from west, brief local heavy bursts move east during afternoon, small chance of thunder.	Rain for a time Rain on and off, but a few hours of more persistent rain likely, heaviest in central highlands. Later scattered showers.
Cloud on the hills?	Lowest morning, rising toward tops Varied cloud banks to some low elevations early in day. The base tending to rise to leave much cloud above 900-1000m, lowering patches in showers.	Most persistent west, breaks east Covering the mountains fairly widely above 700-900m in the morning, lowest central highlands. Base rising, but often capping western tops. Higher breaks form in east.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20% rising to 60%	40%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, rare glimpses of sun. Visibility good away from showers.	Glimpses of sun break through in east. Visibility reduced in rain, then more often good.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	9C tending to lower later in day to 7C. Feeling near or later below freezing as wind increases. Above the summits.	7 or 8C, little change all day. Feeling sub-zero in the wind, -5C if in stronger speeds on tops. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 31 August, 2026

A generally unsettled outlook during the first two weeks of September with frequent rain and strong winds . Low pressure dominates and a series of frontal systems move in from the Atlantic . West to southwesterlies, often gale force over the mountains in the second half of this week. Heavy rain most prolonged in the west where increasingly wet underfoot, streams rising to be in spate. Low cloud often covering the hills. Temperatures varying, some notably cooler days for Scotland, at times more humid air mainly toward the south.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Saturday, 29 August, 2026
