

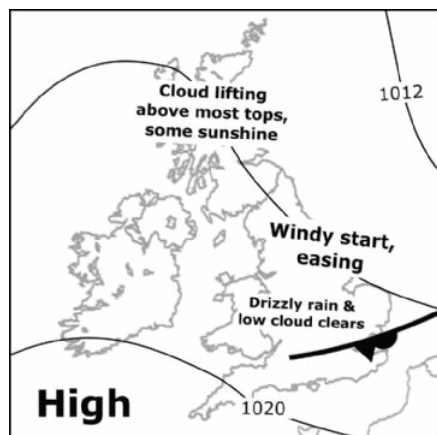
# Southern Uplands

The Galloway hills eastward to the Lammermuir hills. The Cheviots (including higher hills within the adjacent Northumberland NP).



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## General Summary for Tuesday, 10 June, 2025



### British Mountain Summary:

#### Based on forecast chart for noon 10 June, 2025

A fine day developing as overnight rain fades and cloud banks lift and break to reveal patchy sunshine. Early strong breezes easing gradually. Patchy cloud may come and go on higher western tops in the Highlands. Slower to improve in south Wales.

### Headline for Southern Uplands

Windy start, easing. Cloud soon lifting from hills.

## Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 10 June, 2025

<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Westerly 20-25mph in morning, 30mph at first especially Cheviots; easing gradually, to 15mph afternoon-evening.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Feeling cool in morning, gusts will challenge balance at times. Becoming fairly small.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Damp at first, soon dry</b> Patchy light rain or a brief shower around dawn, soon fading out to leave a dry day.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Varied morning banks clear</b> Varied banks of cloud over high terrain at dawn, may be fairly extensive for a couple of hours. Lifting and well breaking above high terrain by late morning.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>90% by mid-late morning</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Early cloud breaking to leave patchwork of cloud and sun. Excellent visibility.
<b>How Cold? (at 750m)</b>	6C at dawn, rising to 9 to 11C, warmest Borders & Cheviots afternoon. Little change, or slight rise further after dark.
<b>Freezing Level</b>	Above the summits

## Southern Uplands - Looking Ahead

	Wednesday 11 June	Thursday 12 June
<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Southerly 20-25mph, tending to strengthen to 30mph western areas later.	Southeasterly 25 to 40mph, speeds may vary during day, gusts 50mph for a time, in places toward some lower elevations.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Fairly small, though sudden strong gusts will challenge stability, notably later in Galloway.</b>	<b>Very blustery, walking arduous on high terrain, affecting balance on exposed tops, sudden buffeting gusts.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Little or no rain</b> Chance odd spots of drizzle in Galloway where in cloud, mostly likely southern slopes.	<b>Thundery rain likely developing</b> Risk of occasional bursts of rain from elevated cloud layers, but several hours at least may well remain dry. Increasing threat with time of more widespread heavy rain developing from the south, risk thunderstorms.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Fairly extensive early, well breaking</b>  Soon fairly extensive in Galloway, patches of cloud forming above 700m Borders and eastward. Cloud will lift and well break at times, though highest terrain at risk of passing cloud caps. Increasingly clearing.	<b>Mostly little away from rain</b>  Possible cloud banks on some southern slopes, mainly near Solway; but most cloud above the hills most of the day. Later if rain develops, banks of cloud filling in across the hills, in places to some lower slopes.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>60%, 20% south Galloway; later 80%</b>	<b>70%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun early gradually improving into decent sunny periods. Excellent visibility.	Weak sun and high cloud layers, becoming mainly overcast. Increasingly hazy, becoming poor visibility in rain.
<b>How Cold? (at 750m)</b>	10 or 11C, rising to 14 to 16C. Warmest temperatures from the Borders eastward.	12C, rising to 15C afternoon; increasingly humid.
<b>Freezing Level</b>	Above the summits	Above the summits

## Planning Outlook

## All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 11 June, 2025

Much warmer and feeling humid as winds shift southerly through Wednesday. Low pressure to the west and a front pushing in brings a risk of thunderstorms on Thursday, soonest in Wales, advancing northeastwards over England and Scotland likely afternoon into evening - some uncertainty of timing. Low pressure is likely to linger later week into weekend - initially staying warm and humid, bringing an ongoing risk of thundery downpours, mixed with sunnier spells. Likely cooler and windier with time over the weekend. Southwesterlies then prevailing with rain at times, most over western mountains into early next week, but a trend toward higher pressure building from the south with drier conditions emerging.
