
Southern Uplands

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General Summary for Friday, 29 August, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 29 August, 2025

Rain frequent or persistent for western Scotland most of the day, some slow-moving heavy bursts, these extending increasingly eastwards over the Highlands. Clusters of showery rain over western England and Wales will drift eastwards during the day on fresh and gusty winds.

Headline for Southern Uplands

Showery, brisk winds.

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 29 August, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 25-30mph, trending westerly through the day, gusty around showers. Noticeably uncomfortable winds for most with walking impeded over high tops.

(Precipitation and its impact)	Clusters of showery rain passing eastward in morning, but some drier conditions for a few hours, particularly toward Lothians.	
	Showery rain becomes more frequent from west during afternoon, risk isolated thunder.	
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive, breaks best in east	
	From dawn, fairly extensive from middle slopes upward, more patchy up to higher slopes Borders/Lothians. Bases rise somewhat with occasional breaks, best in east, but variable cloud returns during and after rain.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	30% west to 60% east	
Sunshine?	Little or no sun west, breaking through at times in east.	
Air clarity (below cloud)	Visibility often poor in cloud and rain, very good out of cloud.	
How Cold? (at 750m)	9 or 10C. May rise slightly from Lothians south to Cheviots.

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Southern Uplands - Looking Ahead

How windy? (On the summits)	South then southeasterly 20-25mph early, rising rapidly to 50-60mph from the west, risk 70mph coastal Galloway for a time.	Southerly, 35 to 45mph, but over 50mph for periods on higher terrain, stronger gusts.
Effect of wind on you?	Deteriorating; walking increasingly strenuous then difficult, severe on high tops in Galloway. Significant wind chill.	Arduous walking conditions across the hills, in places more difficult where exposed.
How wet?	Rain develops widely, heaviest west	Showery rain
(Precipitation and its impact)	Dry start for many areas. Drizzly rain from dawn in Galloway sets in as persistent rain and spreads east, becoming widespread rain, heavy in west afternoon, torrential downpours. May break into showers later.	Rain on and off all day in Dumfries and Galloway, heavy bursts mixed in; showers developing more widely with time.
Cloud on the hills?	Increasingly extensive, particularly Galloway	Most persistent western tops
	From dawn, variable cloud banks from middle slopes up - may be more extensive southern Galloway hills. Filling in extensively above 500m as rain sets in with variable patches to low slopes, southern Galloway perhaps widely shrouded. May break somewhat if rain eases.	Cloud often covering western hills above 600-700m in the morning, patches lowering during rain. Breaking for periods toward or above higher slopes afternoon.
Chance of cloud free summits?	10%	40%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Weak glimpses of sun through high cloud, soon overcast, first in the west. Visibility increasingly poor as rain sets in.	Glimpses of sun mostly Borders. Visibility good away from showers, but general slight haze.
How Cold? (at 750m)	8 or 9C. May briefly rise slightly in the afternoon. Feeling below freezing in	9 or 10C, little change all day. Wind chill feeling below freezing in exposure

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 30 August, 2025

An unsettled weekend ahead driven by low pressure to the west/north of Scotland. Brisk westerlies will drive showery rain onto western mountains, at times drifting eastwards. Some local thundery downpours may arise. Saturday in particular will be very windy with widespread risk of gales and heavy rain setting in from the southwest. Sunny periods will arise between weather features, greatest chance in eastern areas later in the weekend and early next week. Next week stays mixed with low pressure in charge, frequent rain or showers continuing. Some improvement later in the week as pressure tends to rise.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Thursday, 28 August, 2025
