
Southern Uplands

General Summary for Monday, 10 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 10 November, 2025

Heavy rain for much of the Highlands from dawn into the morning, moving northwards, clearing to leave patchy rain, local showers in west; cloud base rising. Some showery rain in the Lakes, drier Pennines. Showers in Wales merging into clusters of heavy rain. Moderate to locally gusty southerly winds.

Headline for Southern Uplands

Brisk winds. Bursts of rain mainly early in day, cloud breaks.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 10 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly 25 to 30mph.	
Effect of wind on you?	Feeling noticeably blustery on exposed higher terrain, starting to affect comfortable walking; marked wind chill.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showery rain mostly morning Rain from before dawn, some heavy bursts advancing north around daybreak, tending to break up and clear in the morning from many areas. Showery rain continues on and off Dumfries & Galloway, but fading.	
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting above many hills Covering the hills fairly widely from dawn, the base rising to upper slopes with breaks increasingly forming to many tops, slowest to clear on southern slopes near Solway.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	30% rising to 70%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Intermittent sunshine. Visibility very good away from rain.	
How Cold? (at 750m)	5 or 6C. Feeling below freezing if exposed to wind, nearer -5C on high tops.	
Freezing Level	Above the summits

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southerly, or southeasterly for a time, strengthening, soonest in southwest, 30 to 45mph, later in daytime 50-60mph. Challenging walking conditions over higher terrain, very gusty in places, becoming more difficult afternoon.	Southwesterly 25-30mph from dawn, easing to 15-20mph or less, later turning southerly, may increase into night. Blustery at first, becoming smaller.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain heaviest in west	Little or no rain during daytime
	Rain soon widespread in the morning, the most prolonged heavy falls across hills near and west of the M74, likely increasingly setting in here. Streams in spate, flooding develops.	Very wet underfoot with streams in spate and flooding following previous rain. Pockets of drizzle locally, but substantially dry during the daytime. Onward into night, risk further heavy rain.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive, lowest south	Most persistent southwest
	Blanket low cloud across the hills Dumfries and Galloway, to lower slopes southern areas. Higher bases north and eastwards but covering hills widely. Some breaks above 600m toward Lothians.	Banks of cloud from lower elevations upward in the morning, remaining most persistent on hills nearer the Solway. Some breaks forming elsewhere, best Pentlands.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Below 10%	20% southwest, to 50% northeast
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast and murky, better visibility locally toward Lothians.	Largely cloudy, misty areas in the morning, may linger. Visibility becoming mostly very good toward Borders.
How Cold? (at 750m)	5C rising in morning to 7C, reaching 9C afternoon; only small fall with height. Feeling below freezing directly in wind.	7C. Feeling like 0C or below if in stronger wind.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 11 November, 2025

Unsettled south-southwesterlies through midweek, periods of heavy rain widespread, further flooding for Wales, the Lakes and southwest Scotland. Mountain gales on Tuesday for England, Wales, S & E Scotland. Cooler than recently in Scotland, but still generally mild England and Wales by day and night.

Later in the week, colder air pushes into Scotland, dropping below freezing over the mountains, with some snow over higher terrain in the Highlands on Thursday-Friday; strong to gale force easterly winds develop widely. Colder northeasterly air is expected to become more widespread into the weekend and next week.

Forecast issued at 16:01 on Sunday, 9 November, 2025
