The Galloway hills eastward to the Lammermuir hills. The Cheviots (including higher hills within the adjacent Northumberland NP).




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General Summary for Wednesday, 17 December, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 17 December, 2025

Extensive gales across the hills. Rain preceded by early snow on higher terrain in the Highlands, lifting briefly above freezing to high tops. Showery bursts follow into western Scotland, heavy and frequent with hail later. England & Wales sees rain much of the day, spreading eastward, heavy at times.

Headline for Southern Uplands

Upland gales. Heavy rain, less north/east; low cloud.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 17 December, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	South-southwesterly 45 to 60mph, powerful gusts in places downslope to north of higher tops. Starting to lessen a little only toward or beyond dusk.		
Effect of wind on you?	Challenging conditions over exposed higher terrain, walking difficult in places, sudden buffeting to some mid-slopes.		
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain most of day, heavy west Rain from before dawn in west, persistent and heavy much of day Dumfries & Galloway, extending eastwards, though patchier Borders. Later breaking into showers in west. Very wet underfoot, streams in spate, renewed flooding likely Dumfries & Galloway.		
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Extensive Shrouding the hills widely all day, from mid-to-lower slopes western areas, but soon spreading east to all hills. Base may begin to rise in west up to dusk. 20%		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast and murky. Better visibility Lothians to Borders if dry for a time.		
How Cold? (at 750m)	1 or 2C rising during morning to 5C. Feeling like -8 to -12C directly in the wind.		
Freezing Level	Above the summits, but from dawn close to very highest tops above 800m.		

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Southern Uplands - Looking Ahead

How windy? (On the summits)	South to southwesterly 30 to 50mph, speed likely to vary, possibly lessening further for a time during day.	Southwesterly 45 to 60mph, may start to lessen a little.
Effect of wind on you?	Changeable, but at times arduous walking conditions over exposed higher terrain, considerable wind chill.	Difficult conditions over higher hills, frequent buffeting from modest elevations upward. Significant wind chill.
How wet?	Rain likely setting in afternoon	Passing showers
(Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy showers mostly Galloway, but often dry for a few hours. Then heavy rain moving in from southwest during day, risk widely heavy afternoon. Breaking up into showery rain and hail (snow high tops) evening into night.	Scattering of showers, most frequent Dumfries and Galloway, risk of hail. Often dry Borders.
Cloud on the hills?	Varied, becoming extensive	Occasionally on tops
	Patchy cloud around some hills, mainly near Solway. Elsewhere may be clearer, but cloud lowering over hills widely in rain.	Patches of cloud drifting across higher tops, mostly above 700-800m. Often clear into the Borders and Pentland hills.
Chance of cloud free summits?	40% dropping below 10%	60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast, varied layers of high cloud, but visibility good where dry, best in north; reducing if rain develops.	Sunshine most frequent east, cloudier Galloway. Visibility often very good, reduced in showers.
How Cold? (at 750m)	3 or 4C, then lowering near 0C into night. Wind chill feeling as cold as -10C on tops.	2 or 3C. Feeling like -12C directly in the wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits, then dropping into the night toward 800m or just above.	Just above highest summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 18 December, 2025

South-southwesterly winds widely remain gale force over the mountains later this week and through into Saturday, severe upland gales for periods. More heavy rain for England and Wales on Thursday, further flooding expected; rain spreads north into Scotland, falling as snow on Munros. Showery by Friday, most frequent in western Scotland with hail, also snow over tops. Another belt of persistent rain likely arrives from the west into Saturday, snow only highest Scottish tops. A switch to east-southeasterly winds by Sunday into early next week, some residual rain and high-level snow, but a drier theme develops and favouring chillier conditions into the Christmas period.

Forecast issued at 16:20 on Tuesday, 16 December, 2025
